GUNNERS WORKING UNDER GAS DIFFICULTIES



In the present attempts of the Hun gunners with the aid of their powerful thrusts, the allied gunners have been playing a stellar role. Though gas attacks are constantly being employed by the Germans, the allied gunners have stuck to their posts, working at times for four hours at a stretch under heavy gas bombardments, being relieved only when wounded and carried behind the lines. Note the camouflaged protection overhead to hide them from any aerial attacks.

AMERICANS AMAZING FEATURE OF THE WAR

LONDON, June 19.—The following estimate of the fighting qualities of American troops was expressed today to the World by two high officers of the British staff who spoke from personal observation:

"The way the Americans have developed as fighters is one of the most amazing features of the war.

Those engaged in the present and last offensive were placed beside a French corps d'elite. It was their first experience in a big battle. The Americans fought as superbly as the crack veteran French corps beside them, displaying all the finest fighting qualities—dash, courage, stubborn tenacity, coolness, initiative and resource.

"The Americans will do even greater things than were expected of them."

COAL PROFITEER IS FINED \$5000

PHILADELPHIA, June 18.—James M. Orr of Clarksville, W. Va., president of the Orr Coal Mining company, was fined \$5000 in the federal court here yesterday for alleged coal profiteering. Both Orr and his company were indicted for charging a price for bituminous coal said to be higher than that fixed by President Wilson, but in view of Orr pleading guilty the government decided to drop the prosecution against the corporation.
