PORTLAND June 21.—Receipts in general were moderate at North Portland for the last 24 hours; total arrivals consisting of 14 cars, and of these six cars consisted of feeders and feeder steers.

Six loads of stocker and feeder cattle came from California overnight, but otherwise arrivals in the cattle division were small. Little killer stuff was available and the general market, while considered slow, was quoted at unchanged figures.

Germany is Too Late Captured Officer Admits

PARIS, June 21.—A French officer, charged with the duty of examining prisoners, had before him a German officer who had been a personal acquaintance before the war. There was nobody to overhear their conversation except a guard who brought the captive into the room where the examinations were in progress. According to the French officer's account of the incident, this is what the German said:

"It is impossible for the war to last much longer. They told us we would win by Christmas, then by Easter, Christmas and Easter went by. When the present offensive began they told us we would win at once. We are further from winning than ever. We must have peace, and that quickly."

"Our losses are frightful. My company has lost 30 per cent in killed and 70 per cent in wounded. The territory lost of our line is hideous. It is all a hospital and cemetery."

"You will save Paris despite our attacks in mass and we will obtain nothing, for there is only one thing to count—the finish. Germany can suffer no more. Our people are at the exhaustion point."

"It is Germany that must have

peace soon, and at any price. We have not been quick enough. French soldiers have postponed too long the German victory, and now it is too late for us."

"They shall not pass"—and they begin to realize it.

FRUIT MEN IN NORTH PROTEST R. R. RATES

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Northwestern fruit growers protested through Senator Polk of Washington, today against the railroad administration's proposed increase of

25 per cent in freight rates. The advance, they claimed, will prove discriminatory and will work a hardship upon them. Senator Polk presented a telegram from the Northwestern Fruit Exchange saying that if the advance goes into effect it will cost the western growers 40 cents
