 ABERDEEN, Wash., July 4.—The July Fourth payroll of Grays Harbor logging camps, which is being met today, approximates \$1,500,000. All the harbor cities, especially Aberdeen, are crowded with woodsmen. Hotels and lodging houses have been forced to place cots in their hallways to accommodate the crowd now in town. Military police have been placed on duty here to look after the 2000 soldiers who will be in the city over the holiday.

Oregon First State Of Union Over Top With W. S. S. Pledges

PORTLAND, Ore., July 4.—"Oregon First" in the W. S. S. drive.

All available information gathered by the Oregon War Savings committee indicates that this state was first in going over the top in the campaign which ended Tuesday.

So far as is known no other state had reported reaching its quota when Oregon's telegram to President Wilson and Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo was ready to send.

Utah, it was said, was almost at the point of victory. In Washington, Seattle's sluggishness in reaching its quota is delaying the entire state, it was reported. This Puget Sound city attempted to register War Stamp pledges by having people come to voting booths, but the plan fell short of results obtained through personal solicitation.

Oregon as a whole will probably, in the final reports, be shown to have exceeded its \$17,500,000 substantially. Multnomah county for instance, has subscribed \$7,000,000, approximately, says District Manager Henry E. Reed. The county's quota, including that of Portland, was \$6,322,280.

There are only three counties in the state which as yet have failed to make official reports of the termination of their campaign. These counties are Walla Walla, Malheur and Harney. Preliminary reports to Associate State Director Wonnacott from these counties contained declarations that while they were not yet over the top they would keep on until they are successful.

"WOOF" IS YANKEE FOR "I WANT EGGS"

 WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN THE FIELD, June 16.—(By Mail)—"Oof" is one of the first things the American soldier learned to say in France.

It is his pronunciation of the Frenchman's word for egg.

The doughboy is a constant egg hunter. On arriving in a village he looks on the march the first thing sought is the source of the town's egg supply. If the troops remain for any length of time the hens of the village are certain of a busy session if they expect to keep up with the demand.

It is nothing uncommon to hear a grinning American tell of having stowed away a dozen eggs at a single meal. If officers expect to have eggs at their meals, their orderlies must get out and hustle to beat the doughboys to the henery. It's a wild race for "Oofs."

A new arrival in France recently joined up with a certain outfit now in Picardy. He hadn't learned what is an egg in French. But he rolled into the first shop he saw that looked like it might sell eggs. He tried every way he knew to tell the shopkeeper he wanted eggs. Then he resorted to sign language. A box was on the counter. The American spied it, hopped up on the counter, sat on the box, then jumped down and flapping his arms wildly, "cackled" loud and long.

Still the French woman did not understand. Other soldiers passing by saw the performance, and "called" "Oof" to the unfortunate bunnie. He fairly stormed the shop with: "Woof! Woof! Woof!"

The shopkeeper retreated. "Woof! Woof!" exclaimed the American.

Then a light dawned in the shopkeeper's eyes. A minute later the doughboy had a dozen eggs.
