SCIENTISTS SENDING COMFORT TO FIGHTERS

Patriotic Work of Scientist Church Explained by A. V. Freel.

The Comforts Forwarding Committee of the Christian Scientists was organized in Boston December 1, 1917, for the purpose of extending aid to soldiers and sailors in the service, and later the work was extended to the refugees in the war swept countries of Europe. In the nature of the task all that the government can be expected to do is to provide the essentials of the men's equipment. It remains for those at home who are willing to exert themselves to add the little things that mean so much to one in service. This work puts a human background into the work, and only with such a background are men moved to do their best.

The Comforts Forwarding Committee was organized with headquarters in Boston and branch committees composed of Christian Scientists have since been organized in eight hundred cities and towns throughout the United States. Three hundred of these have been organized within the last three months.

Through these branches over five hundred pounds of yarn is being distributed each week to persons knitting for men in the service.

These committees in all of the large cities maintain quarters in easily accessible places where forces of workers are kept busy sorting, labeling and forwarding to headquarters in Boston, or distributing to men in the service in the local field, sweaters, socks, vests, helmets and other knitted garments. They also accept articles of second hand clothing, which are renovated and repaired and then sent across the seas to assist the unfortunate ones in Belgium, France or wherever the need is most evident. A large force is constantly at work making new garments and working over old ones for the refugees. In all a thousand workers are giving their time and labor to the cause of freedom.

In the first six months of activity this patriotic organization has accomplished the following work:

Total number of knitted, etc., distributed by this committee

to men in war service 59,890

Total number of garments made by sewing units of Greater Boston and distributed by this committee for men in war service and refugees 19,391

Total number of old and new garments received from the field and distributed by this committee for refugees 61,052

Articles sent out by the field but not through this committee for men in war service and for refugees 61,720

Total number of articles distributed by this committee and its branches from December 1, 1917, to June 1, 1918 291,970

In distributing the above articles this committee has been able to aid in a very effective way many other relief committees that have been in existence for some time, as well as giving very substantial help to men in all branches of war service.

As the work of the branch committees becomes more settled and better understood by all, and the beautiful work that is being accomplished becomes better known the productions of these committees will be largely increased.

The Pendleton branch of the Comforts Forwarding Committee of Christian Scientists began to knit for the soldiers in February last, knitting sixty pairs of socks in four months. In May it was decided to include sewing for the refugee children of the allied countries. Many garments have been completed, and through knitted goods for the soldiers is receiving first attention, sewing for the refugee children is increasing week by week.

The committee has many letters of grateful acknowledgment for articles received from individuals and committees, and is very thankful to give such loving help to men in service and to refugees. Following are extracts from a few of these letters:

"The writer is grateful to you indeed for your package containing comfort articles. You may be sure that this work is appreciated to a far greater extent than any of us can express to you, and between the good organization of our army and the support of those back home, you may be assured that our well cared for 'Bambies' will uphold your very highest ideals."

"About a month ago I was given knitted goods and a sewing kit at the headquarters of the Sons of the American Revolution in Boston, and the lady in attendance there told me that you were lending them a great deal of assistance in carrying on their work. I am very glad to assume you that your efforts are much appreciated by those who have benefited by your generosity. At a time when the more spectacular activities of war work appeal to many people, it is a pleasure to find those who devote some of their time to caring for the comforts of the men."

HOUSEHOLD

Peas.

Green peas are among the most difficult vegetables to can at home. Absolute cleanliness, quick work, attention to every detail, are essential to success. Only young and freshly gathered peas should be canned. Peas are best gathered in the early morning when cool. Work rapidly from the moment they are gathered. Peas should not stand after being shelled. Get them into the previously boiled jars as rapidly as possible. Shell and sort, putting only peas of the same size and degree of ripeness together. Do not use hard, mature peas among tender ones or big peas with very small ones.

An illustration of the demands sometimes made upon photoplayers to obtain certain required scenes for the screen may be found in "Broadway Bill," a new Metro wonder play, starring Harold Lockwood, which will be shown at the Alta theater Sunday and Monday.

For the lumber camp scenes in "Broadway Bill," Mr. Lockwood and his company went to Maine and established a camp on the Rangeley Lakes. They arrived in the midst of a cold spell which did not diminish in intensity materially at any time during their three weeks' stay. On the mildest day the thermometer registered ten below and on the coldest day it dropped to forty-eight below.

Despite this bitter cold the company worked out of doors practically every day. Many pictures with lumber camp locale have been made in the past, but it is doubtful if any was staged under like circumstances; nor is it likely that such splendid results were ever obtained as those who see "Broadway Bill" will doubtless be willing to grant.

Blanching (dipping into hot water) is very important. If well done, it prevents cloudy liquor, makes the peas tender, and also removes some of the gluey substance which coats them.

Blanch by dipping the shelled peas in a clean cheesecloth sack into boiling water one to four minutes, depending on the size of the peas. Put instantly, while hot, into cold water (1 teaspoonful salt to 1 quart water) and remove after about 30 seconds.

Drain and pack to within one-half inch of the top of the previously boiled jar. If the jar is filled too full a few peas at the top may burst and make the liquor cloudy. Add seasoning (one-third level teaspoonful salt and two-thirds level teaspoonful sugar to the quart) and fill with hot water and paddle well to remove all air bubbles. Partially seal jars.

Processing with steam under pressure is recommended. Process plus 15 minutes under pressure of 10 pounds. Seal immediately, cool in a draft-free place. When cold test for leaks, and store in a cool, dark, dry place.

If the intermittent boiling process is used, boil for 90 minutes on the first day, and 60 minutes on the second and third days. Before each subsequent boiling the covers must be loosened, and after each boiling the covers must be securely tightened to make sealing complete. Cool, test for leaks, and store.

If a single period boiling process is used, place the jars in the canner and boil for at least three hours. Seal, cool, test and store.

45,576,000 POUNDS OF

TEA ENTERS U. S. IN N. W.

TACOMA, July 12.—For the year ending June 30, 1918, the port of Tacoma passed 45,576,000 pounds of tea, as against New York's 42,900,000 pounds, and 41,000,000 pounds, through San Francisco. This is the largest amount of tea that has ever been examined at any single port in the United States in a year.
