COLLEGIANS VOTE TO KEEP SPORTS

NEWYO RK, July 12.—Sports in colleges will be continued for the duration of the war, according to a ruling made effective by a conference of officials of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. The delegates will hold a special meeting to discuss plans for the coming fall and winter, probably assembling for this purpose at Washington, D. C., early in August. Representatives of Yale, Harvard and Princeton refused to accept the majority vote of the ruling body and it is probable that at these institutions athletics will be discontinued for the duration of the war, at least. The athletic activities of soldiers and sailors in the uniform of their country, and the intensive body-building benefits of athletics, advocated by leading physical culturists throughout the nation, and the stamp of approval placed on athletic sports in general by the government, have determined the attitudes of the numerous colleges in the United States to a favorable decision in the matter.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 12.—Results from the first civilian summer training camp on the Flattsburg model, held at the University of Oregon, have so pleased Col. John Leader, late of the British army, that he is considering holding a second camp August 1 to August 31. Leader is now professor of military science at the university.

HUNS PAID ITALIANS TO BLOW UP VESSEL

ROME, July 12.—Germany paid \$5,000 lire (\$16,405) for the destruction of the Italian battleship Benedetto-Brin, according to testimony introduced Tuesday at the trial of four Italian sailors and a soldier charged with blowing up the vessel.

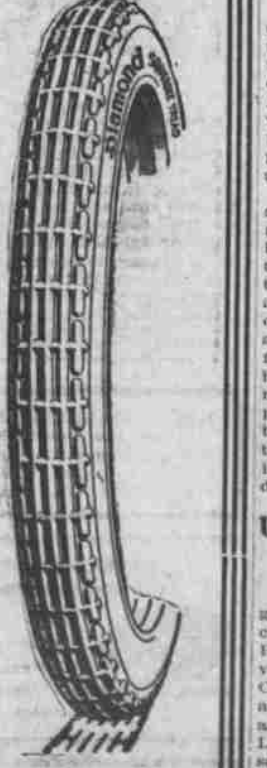
