**Recall Thompson's Threat.**  
HILLSBORO, Ore., July 31.—News of Bennett Thompson's escape from the penitentiary causes belief that he will follow his threat and attempt to revenge himself upon Washington county officers, who were instrumental in his capture. He is known to have made threats that the penitentiary could not hold him and that he would surely escape and even things up with District Attorney Tongue and Sheriff Reeves.

**More Land to Be Opened.**  
LA GRANDE, Ore., July 31.—A quarter million acres of land, formerly mostly within the La Grande land office district and partly in The Dalles and Burns districts, have been thrown open to entry upon the enlarged homestead act, according to advices received by local land office officials today. The enlarged homestead act has been a popular one in this district and the new designations which become effective August 10 will be greatly sought after, it is anticipated.

**Trains Curb Forest Fires.**  
SPOKANE, Wash., July 31.—Fire rains on all the forest fires in the Clearwater country continue to keep the fire situation under good control. This is the good news brought in by forest service officials in returning from the fire front.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 31.—Suit to foreclose the \$2,924,000 principal of a first mortgage was filed yesterday in the Title Insurance & Trust Company, which has served as trustee for the mortgage since the day of its issue, September 21, 1905.

**Flah Wooden Mills Burn.**  
TROY, Utah, July 31.—Two of the largest buildings of the Flah wooden mills, the largest manufacturing in this section and engaged on government contracts, burned today. The loss is estimated at \$500,000. The cause is unknown.

**Ashes Consigned to Sea.**  
WESTPORT, Wash., July 31.—The dory with Captain Andrew Patterson, Spokane, Wash., was compelled with on Sunday when his ashes were taken to sea by the coast guard power boat Tenacious, Captain O. C. Hawthorne, and scattered on the heaving waters of the outer bar.

**La Grande Plans Meeting.**  
LA GRANDE, July 31.—When Executive Secretary Kollock of the state council of defense, and John Hibbard and Captain Russell came to La Grande August 5 to conduct the Union council of national defense, they will first elaborate plans made for the meeting. Chairman Scripps of the local council has inaugurated extensive plans to that end.

**Dairymen Are Called.**  
PORTLAND, July 31.—Dreaders of stock, representatives of condensed milk plants, dairymen, creamerymen, ice cream and cheese manufacturers—in fact, everybody connected with any branch of the dairy business is urged to attend a general conference that will be held in the Commercial club rooms at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon for the primary purpose of saving the dairy industry of this state. The meeting has been called by John D. Meikle, state dairy and food commissioner, by authority of a proclama-tory meeting of men representing the dairy business held last week.

Caldwell, incumbent of the office, has accepted a job in the metal working department of a Vancouver plant. Mayor Caldwell at one time was a member of the metal workers. He was attracted to Portland by the opportunity to do his bit for the country and earn good wages at his trade.

**SHORTEN PANTS, BURN YOUR VEST, AND BE STYLISH**
