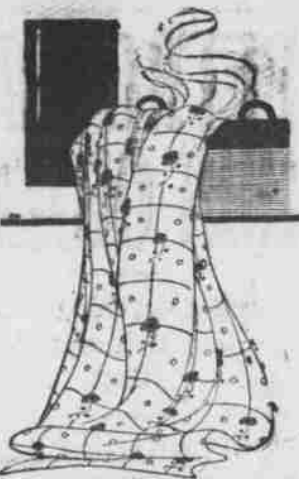

FUGITIVE, CONVICT GIVES UP TO GUN

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Bennett Thompson, life-term convict, who escaped from the Oregon penitentiary on July 29, was recaptured yesterday afternoon near Rainier, by James Jesse, a deputy sheriff of Columbia county. Weary from a fortnight of thin fare and sleepless vigilance, Thompson made no resistance.

"Give me five minutes more and I would have been on my way across the river," was Thompson's comment. "To beat it to Canada and enlist in the army. Then you'd have had a fine chance of getting me."

Deputy Jesse was at Rainier when a message came from Sheriff E. C. Stanwood at St. Helens, advising him that a man thought to be the escaped convict was in the vicinity. The deputy started in search and encountered Thompson in the outskirts of Rainier. The convict had thrown his pack by the roadside and was stopping to drink from the river.

Guns Cowed Him

"I looked up," related Thompson afterward, "straight into two guns, and there wasn't anything left but to give in."

When placed under arrest by Jesse the prisoner denied his identity for some time and a message to Sheriff Stanwood of Columbia county, brought that officer to Rainier to make the identification. Thompson then readily admitted his identity and was taken to St. Helens.

During their trip Thompson was freely communicative and related many details of his escape and flight to the Portland deputies. His sole mistake, he contended had been in neglecting his own advice against appearing in daylight. He spoke of the recapture of Thurber, a fellow convict who escaped with him as an additional example of such folly.

Daylight Travel He Endorsed.

"Thurber and I parted near Lentz," said Thompson, "and my last warning to him was not to travel in daylight. I was a fool when I didn't take my own advice. This was my first and last appearance after sunrise since I made the break."

Thompson told the deputies that the task of sawing the bars through which they made their escape from the penitentiary, via the course of a stream, was simple. He smiled when asked where the saw was procured, but said that the bars were severed in less than half an hour. Thurber and he slipped through with their cloths, leg locked in an old bed to keep it dry.

Then followed almost two weeks of hiding in the brush by day and

stealthy travel by night. Provided with a few dollars, Thompson made one appearance at Malloy and bought provisions, rolled oats and other staple articles, which formed the greater part of their fare.

At one time Thompson was in the outskirts of Portland and met by chance with some one of his old-time acquaintances.

Thompson told the deputies that the attempted escape of other prisoners was part of an organized plan. Four others knew of the severed bars and were to attempt to break the following night, said Thompson.

Thompson is under sentence of life imprisonment for the murder of Mrs. Ida Jennings and Fred Rikman, a chauffeur, on the Jennings ranch near Tualatin.

FIVE DIE IN CLASH; CORONER TO PROBE

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—A coroner's inquest to determine responsibility for a train-street car wreck which killed five persons here yesterday was to be held today. Some among the 29 injured when a freight train on the Chicago belt line railroad struck a street car at right angles, claimed the car crew tried to beat the train to the crossing. Three of the five killed were babies.

Americans Make Drive Possible.

FIND JOBS FOR MILLION.

Federal Employment Service Doing Large Work.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Jobs were found for 1,861,322 persons by the federal employment service during the year ended June 30. This was accomplished, the department of labor announced today, although most of the employment offices have been in operation only a few months and the service itself was established as a separate organization only seven months.

The Chicago office found employment for 221,322 persons, the highest number for a single office.

"CARRY ON MAGNET"

German Soldiers Who Bought It Received Ten Pounds of Thüringian Bacon.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 12.—A "carry-on magnet, efficacy guaranteed," was advertised recently in a German newspaper for its "inventor." The magnet was said to have mystic powers enabling its possessor more easily to endure the food privations of the country.

The price was 200 marks and the

WATER SUPPLY IN MONTEREY IN DANGER

MONTEREY, Aug. 12.—The water supply of Monterey and the town of Carmel, near here, is menaced by a forest fire, which broke from control today, was sweeping up Cheves ridge, thirty miles south of this city, according to H. H. Hunt, ranger of the Monterey national forest.

No steak today? That's a bit unkind!
And sugar is getting rare?
This sort of brings to a fellow's mind
That there must be a war somewhere!

And so it seems there's a million men

Don't bother about the steak! Substitutes for Meat.

As a nation we have depended largely upon meat as a source of protein, i. e., tissue-building food. At the present time, however, meat is not only scarce but also needed by our soldiers and allies. Eggs, which often take the place of meat, are high in price because of the expense of feed. It is therefore necessary for fish, milk, cheese, and tissue-building vegetables to figure prominently in our menus as substitutes for meat and eggs.

Vegetables which may be substituted for meat in the diet are beans, both green and dry, peas and lentils. Soy beans and vetch may be used in place of beans, as both are high in tissue-building properties. Nuts are also excellent meat substitutes.

Soups.
Abbreviation key: c, cup; T, tablespoon; t, teaspoon.

Cream soups, because of the large amount of milk, may form the main dish of the meal and offer splendid opportunity for using the odds and ends of vegetables, cereals and fish or meat.

Thin White Sauce.—The following is the foundation for all cream soups:
1 T fat.
1 T flour.
1 c milk.
1-2 t salt.

Make paste of flour and small amount of milk. Heat remainder of milk, add paste, cook in double boiler or over hot water 30 minutes. Add butter just before serving.

Cream of Salmon Soup—
2 c milk.
3 T flour.
2-4 c canned salmon or left-over fish.

2 T butter or drippings.
Speck salt and pepper.
Make white sauce of milk, flour, butter, salt and pepper. Break salmon in small pieces, add to white sauce; reheat; stir well, and serve.

Cream of Pea, Bean, or Vetch Soup—
1-2 c peas or cooked beans or cooked vetch.
2 c thin white sauce.

2 c water.
Crush beans, peas, or vetch to pulp, add to hot white sauce. Reheat, beat, and serve.

Scotch Soup.—U. S. department of agriculture.
With bread and dessert, this dish is enough for lunch or supper.

2 1/2 quarts water.
1-4 c rolled oats.
5 potatoes cut in small pieces.
2 onions, sliced.
2 T flour.

2 T fat.
Boil the water and add the oatmeal, potato and onion. Add on-half teaspoon of salt and one-half teaspoon of pepper. Cook for one-half hour. Brown the flour with the fat and add to the soup. Cook until thick. One cup of tomato adds to the flavor. Serves five people.

MEAT SUBSTITUTES.

Corn Meal Souffle.
1 c milk.
1-4 c corn meal.
1 T fat (butter or drippings).
1 t salt.

Heat milk in double boiler. Add corn meal and salt and cook 15 minutes. Add fat. Turn the mush on two beaten egg yolks. Beat thoroughly, then add two stiffly beaten egg whites, and fold them in carefully. Turn into a greased baking dish. Set dish in pan of hot water. Bake in moderate oven. Test with toothpick as for cake.

Vegetable Pot Pie.

1-4 lb lima beans (well soaked)
1 lb tomatoes.
1 can corn.
8 medium sized potatoes.
2 stalks of celery.
2 small onions.
1 t salt.
1-4 t pepper.
1 T flour.
1 c milk.

Peel, parboil, and slice the potatoes. Cook the beans with celery, onions, salt and pepper until the beans are tender. Grease the baking dish, put in alternate layers of bean mixture, corn, potatoes, and tomatoes. Blend the milk and flour together and pour over the mixture. Bake about one-half hour; then place small baking powder biscuits on the top and bake until biscuits are done.

Note: In making baking powder biscuits use one-half cup corn meal instead of all white flour.

Rice Milaine Fashion.
2 T butter.
1 slice of onion (chopped)
1-2 c rice.
Salt to taste.
2 c stock or hot water (more if needed).
1-2 c grated cheese.

Legion Indorses Disque.

SPOKANE, Aug. 12.—Two hundred and twenty-five delegates, representing 44,727 members of the Loyalty Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen in Idaho, Montana, eastern Oregon and eastern Washington, at a meeting here today indorsed the government's airplane program and the administration of Colonel Disque, head of the spruce production bureau of the northwest.

Fish Nearly Costs Life.

ASTORIA, Aug. 12.—The News, a trawler who fishes outside the mouth of the river, had a narrow escape from drowning on Saturday afternoon. He had hooked a 50-pound salmon, pulled it up to the boat and stuck his gaff into it. Just at that moment the boat, which was running, was struck by a wave and careened over, throwing News into the water.

Although he was flailing alone, News managed to grab the edge of his craft as it went by and, after being towed several hundred feet, was able to pull himself on board. He then pulled in his line and secured the big fish which had nearly cost him his life.

OVER THE NORTHWEST

Insurance Status Fixed.

CAMP LEWIS, Aug. 12.—Soldiers granted indefinite furloughs for industrial purposes will be allowed to retain their war risk insurance provided application was made while in active service, but as they are of a non-pay status no pay accrues from which an allotment of any kind may be paid, according to a bulletin issued at camp today. The bulletin was based upon a ruling of the Judge-Advocate General. Payment of premiums must be made from private funds. The advocate general's office held soldiers on indefinite furloughs are in a position analogous to that of a soldier in the reserve, or in retirement.

Accused Men Released.

ABERDEEN, Aug. 12.—H. W. Jarvis, E. McNab, P. B. Campbell and James Taylor, arrested here and at Vancouver, Wash., on allegations of fraud in connection with sales of Oklahoma lands, were released after a night hearing by Justice William Baumert.

Slackers Are Warned.

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Time to comments that there are instances of shirkers and slackers using shipyards as a harbor employment there being a reason for placing men of draft age in the deferred classification list, John H. Stevenson, branch officer for the Emergency Fleet Corporation in classification and transfer, has addressed a communication to local boards in every county of the state, asking that information of specific cases of the character be forwarded to his department.

Big Fruit Plant Assured.

MEDFORD, Aug. 12.—E. M. Radovan, of San Francisco, is in Medford preparing to build a \$25,000 fruit evaporating plant at once. Mr. Radovan came here last year and signed up contracts with local fruit growers. He planned to erect the plant early in the spring but his plans were de-

SEATTLE, Aug. 12.—The entire sockeye salmon pack of Alaska and the North Pacific is to be taken over by the government, according to men by E. E.
