JAPANESE COLONEL VISITS CAMP DIX
Cavalry Officer Conferences With General Scott and Inspects Remount Depot.

CAMP DIX, N. J., Aug. 15.—For the first time since the opening of the cantonments Camp Dix today had an official guest a military representative of America's new partner in the new Russian campaign of intervention when Col. Ishabashi of the Imperial Japanese Cavalry spent several hours in conference with Major General Scott.

Col. Ishabashi spent much time inspecting the work of the Camp Dix remount depot, where thousands of horses and mules are trained for army purposes. He showed much interest in the care given the animals in disease prevention and surgical work.

Capt. Philip J. Tornini of Brooklyn has been made camp intelligence officer succeeding Lieut. Marshall Shantz who has been assigned to a command in the 7th Battalion of the Depot Brigade.

REMEDY IS FOUND FOR EPIDEMIC IN U. S. ARMY CAMPS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Medical science has found a remedy for "camp fever," a disease of the lungs that assumed the proportions of an epidemic in the army camps and cantonments last winter, and which caused many deaths. The surgeon general's office announced that the remedy strikes at the root of the evil. Health conditions at all camps in this country remain satisfactory.

HAVARIANS TO CUT DOWN MEAT EATING.

Twelve Meatless Weeks Decried; Germans and Hungarians at Odds on Customs Plan. ZURICH, Aug. 15.—Von Drettrech, the Havarian minister of the interior, announces in parliament twelve meatless weeks to save the needed 200,000 head of cattle. He says that the milk and fats supply is unsatisfactory and the whole food supply is seriously endangered by profiteers who continue to hide food. He denies, however, that the Havarian food supply is desperate and says that rumors calling it black are lies.

The German-Hungarian economic press criticizes the negotiations now proceeding at Salzburg between Germany and Austria-Hungary for making a custom union between the two countries. The Hungarian demand for the abolishing of all German import duties for Hungarian agricultural products into Germany alarms the German agricultural societies, and the German press hints that the German government dare not agree to such demands which would injure German interests. Hungary also demands the maintenance of high import duties against both German and Austrian industrial products entering Hungary.

MALVY AND FAMILY LEAVE FOR EXILE.

PARIS, Aug. 15.—Louis Malvy, former minister of the interior, left Sunday with his family for Spain, where he must live five years in exile in penalty for malfeasance in office, on which charge he was convicted several days ago by a high court when the charge of treason was dropped.

What Colors on Hat Coords of Soldiers Signify.

When you see a soldier on the street you sometimes wonder to what department of the army he belongs. If you will memorize the following information you can easily tell them whether the soldier is from the artillery, the infantry or whatever branch he may belong.

A blue cord signifies that the wearer belongs to the infantry; red denotes artillery; yellow, cavalry; buff, quartermasters' corps; red and white, engineers' corps; orange and white, signal corps; red and black, ordnance; black and white, field clerk; maroon and white, medical corps; black and white, officers; silver and black, adjutant general's clerk; green, instructor home guards; green and white, home guards.
