### UNCLE SAM HAS GIRL OUTLOOKS IN CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 20.—Parched atop lofty peaks in national parks of northern California two girls are braving the lonely and often dangerous life in these isolated districts to serve as lookouts for the United States forest service. Miss Hollie M. Daggett, daughter of John Daggett, formerly lieutenant governor of California and at one time superintendent of the United States mint at San Francisco, and Miss Mollie Ingoldby of Los Angeles are two of only three women employed as lookouts by the forest service in the United States.

This is Miss Daggett's fifth season as lookout at the Eddy's Gulch station near Sawyer's bar, Siskiyou county. She was born and reared in the shadow of the mountain where she now keeps watch and upon her vigilance depend the promptness and effectiveness of the government's fire fighting forces. She was the first woman lookout employed in this country.

Miss Daggett's cabin is filled with skins and furs that evidence her skill as a trapper and hunter and Acting Forest Ranger Lewis Carrigan reports that she has rendered valuable assistance to the United States biological survey in its campaign against predatory animals. Miss Daggett's sister, Miss Leslie Daggett, who lives at the residence, the White House, one of the show places of the district and Miss May Abgren are reported to have rendered valuable assistance in July by riding horseback over the district and recruiting an emergency fire fighting crew when all men usually available were already combating the flames.

Miss Ingoldby's post is a tiny government observatory at an elevation of 7,245 feet on the very summit of Mount Hough in the Plumas national forest. Here with her sister she lives, obtaining her supplies with those packed in from time to time from Taylorville, in northern Plumas county, by mining operators. Miss Ingoldby is city bred and 22 years old.

"This is my ideal of a fine way to pass a delightful summer, while at the same time doing worth-while work," Miss Ingoldby wrote to the forestry office here. "And most important of all it releases one more man for active service."

### Best French Gets Best Girl—Boys Studying Hard

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The army is solving more than one national difficulty. In pre-war days, perhaps owing to our insularity, the English were not what might be called good linguists.

But the army has fixed all that. Its grammar might leave a lot to be desired, but when it comes to making itself understood the army "gets there."

"Practically all of the boys have mastered the essentials of the French language. For instance, they have all learned to say 'Bong soir, madame, voulez-vous promener avec moi?'"

To keep their linguistic accomplishments up to the mark the Americans have joined them, and new phrases have to be adopted.

"Guess I've got you trimmed," says the Yankee, as he walks off arm in arm with "madame" to teach her "American."

LONDON, Aug. 20.—One hundred and fifty discharged soldiers who have lost their sight have taken unto themselves wives and are now settled quietly down to home life.

"And a topping lot of girls they have picked up with," says Sir Arthur Pearson. "You might think they would only get the 'left-overs,' but they know too much for that."

### NO GERMAN BOYCOTT UNLESS WE SAY SO

So Bonar Law Indicates in Replying to Question in House of Commons.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Any steps taken in respect to the Paris resolution on trade will, as far as possible, be taken in conjunction with the United States, Chancellor of the Exchequer Bonar Law announced in the House of Commons today.

This refers to the resolution adopted at the Economic Conference of the Allies held in Paris in June of last year relative to trade after the war, the plan calling for a virtual boycott of German goods. Recently numerous English newspapers have expressed doubt that the United States would join with Great Britain and the other Allies in carrying out the provisions of the Paris resolution, it being held by them that President Wilson's utterances preclude any trade war after the war.
