BRITISH ATTACK MAY

New Zealanders on Northern Outskirts of City, British Move East on Scarpe.

NOT SINGLE GERMAN IN BAPAUME AT NOON

Prisoners Taken by British Since August 21, are 21,000.

PARIS, Aug. 27.—The Matin de-clares that not a single German remained in Bapaume at noon.

BY LOWELL MELLETT United Press Staff Correspondent) WITH THE BRITISH IN FRANCE. Aug. 27.-The British launched a new attack south of Bapaume at 4:45 this morning which is designed to make the situation below Bapaume as precarjous as that above, where the line extends actually beyond the city. New Zealanders are on the northern outskirts of Bapaume, having taken Beaugnaire during the night. They captured prisoners from three battalions including a battalion commander. Similar equals the British are der. Simultaneously the British are moving eastward along the Scarpe, the Highlanders on the north and Canadians on the south, utilizing yesterday's important gains.

Take Advanced Trenches Easily. The British last night swept down the Henenil slopes and over the ad-vanced trenches of the Hindenburg line, capturing these easily, but found the Germans holding hard on the support lines.

Fighting below Bapaume is unu ally violent little attempt having beer made yet to carry Bapaume directly, although there is patrol fighting constantly in the outskirts and British reconnotiering patrols entered the city late Sanday.

Canadians Withdraw, Then Smash, LONDON, Aug. 27.—General Haig today reported that the Canadians after capturing Wancourt carried their lines cast of Guernappe. A counter attack forced the British back from Longueville to Bazentin-E-Grand and Highwood. The counter attack was broken up there and the British positions reactablished became Highwood.


