**MOVE TO PUT IDLE ACRES TO WORK STARTED**

A movement to draft every idle acre west of the Rocky Mountains for food production in accordance with plans laid down by President Wilson and Secretary of the Interior Lane, was to be started at a conference held today between Pacific Coast land experts and the State Council of Defense.

Among those invited to speak were E. F. Benson, Commissioner of Agriculture, State of Washington; W. H. Crawford, State Land Commissioner, Oregon; Ralph P. Merritt, Federal Food Commissioner for California; Mortimer Fleischacker, of California, and representatives of similar boards in Oregon and Washington.

### ARMY DESERTERS

**FIGHT U. S. POSSE**

**Sheriff and Aid Killed in W. Va. Hills.**  
HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Aug. 28.—A number of alleged deserters from the United States army, tracked by a posse into the hills of Mingo county, West Virginia, resisted arrest today, and in a pitched battle Deputy Sheriff George Dillon and a man named Ellis were killed.

Aid was asked from Charleston, and a special train carrying deputy United States marshals and members of the state military police, is rushing to the scene.

Twenty members of the militia reserve from this city are en route to Mingo.

### WIFE OF CONSUL OF PERSIA KILLS SELF

**CHICAGO, Aug. 29.**—Mrs. Fannie Baaba, 56, wife of the Persian consul, R. Baaba, committed suicide by shooting herself. Baaba is said to be in Washington.

Mrs. Baaba, federal officials said, was to have been questioned soon in connection with complaints that some German subjects have reached Germany with passports granted them as Persian subjects.

### SUGAR CONFISCATION THREATENED IN UTAH

**SALT LAKE, Aug. 29.**—W. W. Armstrong, federal food administrator, has issued a statement in which he declares he will send a circular letter to every housewife in Utah threatening to confiscate all hoarded sugar that is not divided with those who do not have sufficient for canning.

He expresses the opinion that there is sufficient sugar hoarded in Utah to supply the state's reasonable need if it were "unhoarded."

### 21 INDICTED FOR FRAUDS IN RAINCOATS

**NEW YORK, Aug. 29.**—Twenty-one indictments against individuals and corporations, charged with manufacturing defective raincoats to be sold to the government, have been handed down here.

The indictments were found under the sabotage act, section three, of which provides a maximum penalty of thirty years in prison and \$10,000 fine upon conviction.

### WIND RAISES SKIRTS AND AMUSEMENT CO. DRAWS A \$200 FINE

**BOSTON, Aug. 28.**—The use of compressed air released in puffs to elevate women's skirts as they passed over the concealed source of the blasts shocked Secretary J. Frank Chase of the Watch and Ward society and he made a complaint against the Rideaway Construction company, operator of "The Pill" at Revere beach.

The company was fined \$200.

### Soldier Held for Polygamy.

**PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 27.**—Corporal Stanley Kosonki, aged 22, in the military guardhouse at Vancouver barracks facing civil arrest on a charge of polygamy, while two young girls each tearfully proclaimed him to be her lawful husband. The two girls who say they are the brides of the young soldier are Mrs. Gertrude of Milwaukee, Wis., and Mrs. Violet Kosonki, of 685 1-2 Fourth street, Portland.

**Local Disturbances Confirmed by State Department.**

**LONDON, Aug. 28.**—American and Japanese troops Sunday night drove the Bolsheviks back six miles on the Ussuri river, in eastern Siberia, says a delayed Vladivostok dispatch.

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.**—Consul Caudwell reported to the state department today some disturbances at Vladivostok of a local nature. The department presumed, however, the matter had been attended to with no change in the government.

The department knew nothing of the report that General Pleshkoff had seized anti-Bolshevik leaders in Siberia.
