WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—The senate has passed the bill exempting Liberty bonds from income taxes and excess profits taxes up to \$30,000 worth. The house has already passed the measure which is designed to help the fourth campaign.

ADMIT U-BOAT LOSS TO GERMAN PEOPLE

Sacrifices Will be in Increasing Number, Semi-Official Admiralty Despatch Says.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 19.—A semi-official German admiralty despatch, commenting on the list which the British admiralty published of 150 U boat commanders whose vessels had been disposed of, says there are some inaccuracies regarding the rank of the officers, which does not allow conclusions to be drawn of the number of U boats lost, and continues:

"The German people know too well of the heavy fight which is necessitated by our U boat crews, and that sacrifices have to be made by them in increasing numbers. We regret the loss of the U boats, but it can be understood by all experts in view of the growing counter measures and the greater number of U boats sent out against the enemy. Serious reflections would only be justified if the construction of U boats did not surpass the number destroyed."

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 18.—Federal authorities here today have discovered the secret methods used by German spies to communicate with the submarines operating off the coast. The announcement was made following the arrest of Charles Pink and Louis Strauss, two alleged German agents in secluded points on the beach about 30 miles from Jacksonville. Details of the system are not revealed by the officers.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the office of the City Recorder in Pendleton, Oregon, up to 5 o'clock p. m. on September 25th, 1918, for cleaning the paved streets of the City of Pendleton for one year.

Specifications for said work are as follows: "Main street from the bridge across the Umatilla river to Bluff street, Court street from Vincent street, Court street from Alta street, Garden street from Cottonwood street, and Cottonwood street from Court street to Webb street are to be cleaned every other day.

All other paved streets, including those streets now under contract to be paved, to be cleaned twice a week. Main, Court, Alta and Cottonwood streets to be cleaned at night, cleaning to be commenced and finished at such time as the street committee may designate.

The contractor to keep all sewers and catch basins open, and to empty all garbage and scrap cans every day, and to furnish a wagon to contain and haul off all cleanings, all work to be done at all times to the satisfaction of the street committee.

The contractor must furnish a bond in the penal sum of one thousand dollars for the faithful performance of his contract.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check in the sum of one hundred dollars made payable to the acting mayor of the city of Pendleton, to be returned to the bidder if unsuccessful and to be forfeited if the bid is accepted and the bidder fails to enter into a contract in accordance with the terms of his said bid.

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ITALY'S WAR TOLL IS 1,350,001 MEN

ROME, Sept. 18.—Losses in the Italian armistice since Italy entered the war amount to 1,350,001 killed or permanently disabled according to a statement by Francesco Nitti, minister of the treasury. He declared: "After the war Italy will be stronger than ever in men, due to the cessation of emigration. Our difficulties are in the labor field for no fewer than five million men have been called since the beginning of the war."

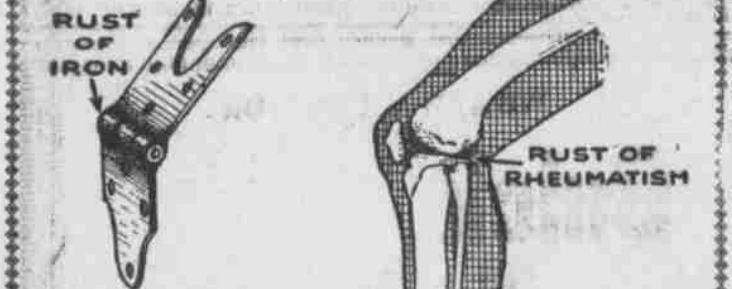

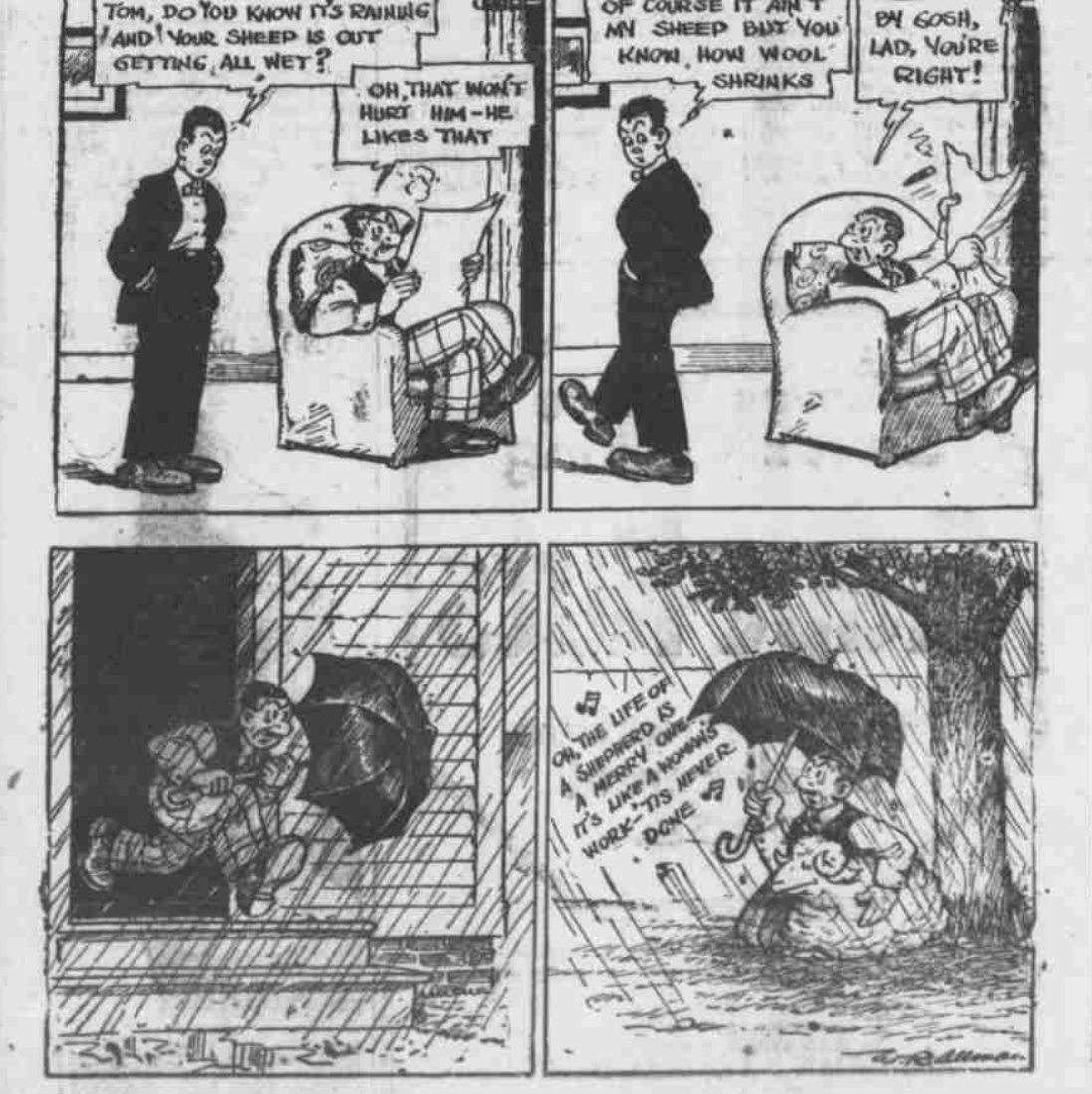
