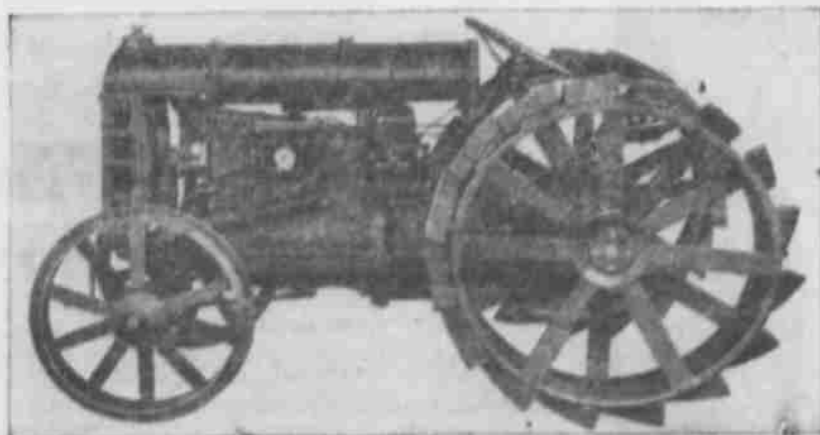

GRIFFITH'S FILM IS COMING TO THE CITY

"Hearts of the World" Coming to the Arcade Theater for 3-Day Showing.

D. W. Griffith's wonderful photoplay, "Hearts of the World," which comes to Pendleton to open an engagement at the Arcade Wednesday, is now playing to bigger business throughout the country than his other famous production, "The Birth of a Nation" did when it was first shown to the public some few years ago.

"Hearts of the World" is in itself a epic, and its transcription on the screen is nothing less than a triumph of artistry over the frightfulness with which the German Kaiser has sought to dominate the world.

That horror as it affected the homes of innocent people in France is reproduced with the utmost fidelity to truth and nature, with pictures of fighting in the trenches and the open battle field of Europe. Some of the introductory pictures show Griffith being speeded on his way by the British premier, David Lloyd George, and then setting his camera up in a dug out within a few yards of the front lines of the invaders.

Apart from the gripping reality of the war scenes the play has the elements of the most intense human interest, and they are acted in such wonderful historic realism that it is impossible to tell where the professional actors project their personalities into the actual incidents of the devastation of a peaceful French village by the despotic Huns.

Civilians Admitted To Train Camps for Officers in Army

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—Applications of civilians for admission to the several officers' training schools may now be received, the war department announced today.

The age limits for admission of civilian applicants to the schools are from over 18 to less than 45 at the date of registration. Special induction for training at these schools will be regulated so that a fair proportion of candidates shall come from either the army at large in accordance with existing conditions, or civilians in Class I-A or civilians of the deferred classification, on grounds other than industry, occupation, or employment, including agriculture.

Civilians in Class I-A, if they fail to win commissions after the course of training, will remain in the army as enlisted men. Civilians entitled to deferred classifications will return to that status if they fail to win commissions.

Applications must be submitted to army officers on duty at the various educational institutions designated and not to the war department. It is announced. A list of such institutions will be made public by the war department in a few days.

WAR GENERAL OFFERS REWARD FOR FIRST YANKEE PRISONER

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN LOUISIANA, Sept. 20.—Orders captured by American troops in the Tappan sector and signed by the commander of a German division offer a reward of 400 marks to the German soldier bringing in the first American prisoner. The German commander is unusually anxious, apparently, for in another order he threatens to send an entire regiment out on patrol if it continues to fail to produce any American prisoners.

150 AMERICAN AIRMEN SWOOPED DOWN ON ENEMY

LONDON, Sept. 20.—One hundred and fifty American airmen swooped down on a road crowded with German tanks during the advance into the St. Mihiel sector, dropping bombs and firing machine guns, according to reports of the American first personally conducted battle, printed here.

The Germans were retreating along two main roads, the dispatches said. One of these was closed by American fire, and the Germans were all sent down the other road, with the result that they were seen and attacked.

CHICAGO HAS FIRST BIG DRAFT ROUND-UP

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Agents of the department of Justice, assisted by 2,000 members of the American Protective League, arrested 22,000 suspected draft slackers in Chicago and its suburbs. Thousands were men who had registered, but failed to carry their registration cards. They were, ball parks, movies, bathing beaches, railroad stations, docks and every public and semi-public place in the city was subjected to raids.

An indignant protest was voiced by victims but without avail. The city police co-operated. Jail, police stations, warehouses and halls were packed with prisoners. The roundup resulted in 200 men being turned over to the draft boards, while 200 waved formalities and agreed to be inducted into service at once. They were sent to Camp Grant. When the roundup ended, 1,400 men were held on the Municipal Pier without cards, compelled to sleep in a cement floor. The majority of these subsequently obtained their liberty.

Pershing Wants Men to Be Less Reckless in Deserving Wounded

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Sept. 19.—With a large proportion of the American casualties in recent actions has been due to gallant attempts to rescue wounded officers and men by unskilled soldiers that Gen. Pershing has been compelled to issue a general order calling attention to the fact that the regulations prohibit members of the fighting force to leave their proper position even for this purpose.

Noting that voluntary men, however gallant and selfless, in some instances have fallen casualties, the general has had to the serious consideration of the highest command, the order explains that the loss of an officer, non-commissioned officer or man by such conduct might deprive a detachment of a leader upon whom command depended. Thus ending the conduct of voluntary men.

The order concludes with the direction that every proper effort is to be made to rescue the wounded and place them in safety.

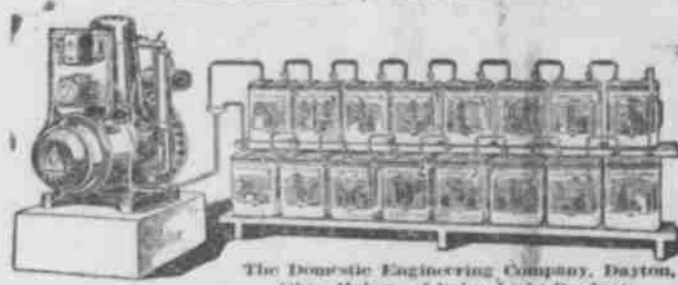
