BRITISH MAKE SMASH DURING HEAVY STORM

BRITISH AIRCRAFT, Sept. 21.—The British, in the midst of a terrific storm, delivered a smashing attack on a three mile front east of Lempire and Erith, this morning where the Germans still hold outpost defenses before the Hindenburg line. Spurs leading from the outpost ridge and trench masses about Lempire Farm and Locustet coupe made the going hard, but between 280 and 400 prisoners are already reported taken.

CAMP STORY CARRIED BY AIRPLANE

Corporal William A. Myers writes his sister, Mrs. John W. Johnson, Pendleton, from Camp Kearney, which he says is the hottest place this side of some place. All letter mail for the camp is carried by airplane from San Francisco.

My Dear Sister:

Your most welcome letter reached me the 10th so I will now answer it. The weather here is so hot that we can hardly stand it in the office but we manage to get by. Today there was a regular dust storm and it was so hot that we had to quit for every time we touched anything it left a muddy spot. We have got a big tent for headquarters and the sun beats down on it at all hours of the day, but thank the Lord, we won't have to stay here long. It is worse than Calcutta ever was. We wear an overcoat in the night and don't wear anything in the day.

Carl and I have been separated now. Carl was sent to the 1st. a new regiment, but we are in the same division, so we won't be far apart. I will try and get you a half dozen pictures as soon as I can now. I thought I would get some last payday but when I went to pay for my glasses they took all but stage fare to camp so I had to wait again. There are more men coming in here every day now. We will soon have a full camp of 4500 men. This camp covers more ground now than Pendleton ever will and it is nearly all tents, just the kitchens are wooden buildings. The aviators say it is the hottest thing they ever saw from up in the air about 2000 feet. They carry all the mail from this camp so your letters all reach me from Fresno by air.

Well, I have said about all there is to say now so will close for this time. Address your next letter thus: Corporal William A. Myers, Personnel Division Headquarters, Co. 1st Inf., Camp Kearney, California. From your loving brother, CORPORAL WILLIAM A. MYERS.
