EMBARGO TO GO ON GRAIN SHIPMENTS TO 10 POINTS IN U. S.

CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—Effective September 18, an embargo has been placed against all shipments of grain consigned or re-consigned to Duluth, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Milwaukee, St. Joseph, Omaha and Council Bluffs. Future shipments to these markets also will be regulated on the permit basis. The permits will be issued in cooperation with the food administration.

Application may be made by shipper or agent at point of origin. The grain control committee at each market will approve only such requests as can be given storage, and will notify the agent at point of origin that shipments may be made accordingly.
The embargo is due to rapid approach to the limit of grain storage in primary markets because of the advanced movement in wheat and to anticipate heavy movement of wheat and other grains.
