NOTICE OF REFERENDUM ORDERED BY PETITION OF THE PEOPLE TO REPEAL ORDINANCE NO. 919.

A referendum petition having been filed with the Recorder of The City of Pendleton on February 6, 1917, for the repeal of Ordinance No. 919, and transmitted to the Common Council, which on its action thereon, a vote will be taken on said referendum, ordered by petition of the people at the next regular city election. The following is the form and number in which the measure will be printed on the official ballot:

REFERENDUM ORDERED BY PETITION OF THE PEOPLE.

To repeal Ordinance No. 919, granting the Standard Oil Company, a corporation, permission to locate, erect, operate and maintain warehouses, tanks and other necessary buildings on certain lands within The City of Pendleton for the storage and distribution of Petroleum and its products and other kinds of merchandise.

The full title and text of such measure is as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 919.

"An Ordinance granting to the Standard Oil Company, a corporation, permission to locate, erect, operate and maintain warehouses, tanks and other necessary buildings on certain lands within The City of Pendleton for the storage and distribution of Petroleum and its products and other kinds of merchandise."

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF PENDLETON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Standard Oil Company, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of California, and authorized to do business in the State of Oregon, is hereby granted permission, subject to the terms and conditions herein expressed, to locate, erect, operate and maintain warehouses, tanks and other necessary buildings on certain lands within the City of Pendleton, Oregon, and to use said premises and the structures thereon for the storage and distribution of Petroleum and its products and other merchandise handled by said Company, for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years.

Section 2. The powers, rights and privileges granted in Section 1 of this ordinance are granted subject to the condition that in accepting the same, the said Standard Oil Company, a corporation, agrees to save and hold harmless The City of Pendleton from all damages to any person, person, association or corporation, which may be caused in any manner by the use and occupancy of the said premises by the said Standard Oil Company, or its agents, or any other person, in any such suit or action, the said grantee agrees to pay such judgment within sixty days after the same shall become final.

The Common Council of The City of Pendleton, Oregon, has ordered that at the next general election to be held in the said City of Pendleton, that a vote shall be taken on a measure proposed by initiative petition, filed with the Recorder of the said city and transmitted to the said Common Council as follows:

The following is the form and number in which the measure will be printed on the official ballot:

PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION.

Charter amendment authorizing The City of Pendleton to incur a bonded indebtedness not exceeding \$25,000 in addition to all other indebtedness heretofore authorized for the purpose of constructing, enlarging and extending its system of gravitation works and other public works and other indebtedness from taxation.

The full title and text of such measure is as follows:

A BILL.

To propose by initiative petition an Act to amend the Charter of The City of Pendleton, Umatilla County, State of Oregon, and to authorize and empower the City of Pendleton to incur a bonded indebtedness not exceeding \$25,000.00 in addition to all other indebtedness heretofore authorized, and to issue, sell and dispose of negotiable bonds to an amount not exceeding \$25,000.00 in addition to all other bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by said city for the purpose of constructing, enlarging and extending its system of gravitation works and other public works and to supply said city and its inhabitants and the inhabitants of the territory adjoining the said city and the territory in the vicinity of such gravitation system with water, and to exempt such bonds from taxation, and declaring that said bonds nor any indebtedness evidenced by them shall be taken into account in computing the heretofore authorized indebtedness which The City of Pendleton may incur.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF PENDLETON:

The People of The City of Pendleton do ordain as follows:

That the Charter of The City of Pendleton, Umatilla County, Oregon, be amended by adding thereto a section to be numbered "I C C," which shall read as follows:

Section I C C. That The City of Pendleton shall have power and authority and is hereby authorized and empowered to incur an indebtedness not exceeding \$25,000.00 in addition to all other indebtedness heretofore authorized and to issue, sell and dispose of negotiable bonds to evidence such indebtedness to an amount not exceeding \$25,000.00 in addition to all other bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by the said city for the purpose of constructing, enlarging and extending its system of gravitation works of the said city, to supply the said city and its inhabitants and the inhabitants of the territory adjoining the said city and in the vicinity of the said gravitation system with water, the bonds issued pursuant to this section shall be known as "Water Bonds, Series D, D," and shall have the same rank, priority, and shall be numbered individually, commencing with the first bond issued pursuant to this section and shall be subject to the provisions of the next preceding issue of said bonds; no bond issued pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be subject or liable to any taxation, and none of them, nor any indebtedness evidenced by them shall be taken into account in computing the heretofore authorized indebtedness which the said City of Pendleton may incur.

Yanks, Punish Boche
Treachery With Flames

YANKS PUNISH CHEWY UP WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY NORTHWEST OF VERDUN, Oct. 15.—When New York troops captured the village of Abris-St. Louis a number of Germans came out of their hiding places with their hands and feet supposed to have surrendered. When the Americans came nearer the Germans suddenly dropped their hands and seized hand grenades, threw them with deadly effect, killing and wounding a number of the New York boys.

The survivors retreated and told the story. Their more New York troops went forward. They were armed with flame throwers and gas projectors and filled the village with flame and gas until not a single German escaped.

Worcester Child Strangling When Doctor Arrives.

WORCESTER, Oct. 15.—Police surgeon Richard J. Shanahan has saved the life of one week old Olga Zinkevich by removing from her throat a cog wheel measuring three-quarters of an inch in diameter which the child had attempted to swallow.

This the infant secured and proceeded to swallow. Dr. Shanahan removed the cog wheel without resorting to tracheotomy, being able to reach it with forceps.

SALEM, Oct. 15.—The whereabouts of Goldie Lengle, a 16-year old girl, missing since October 2, is a mystery to the police of Portland. Miss Lengle is said to have become infatuated with a soldier about a week before she disappeared. Miss Lengle is described as a pleasing young woman with a very quiet disposition. When last seen she wore a brown silk skirt, white waist, brown hat and khaki outer coat. The woman's prospective bureau is conducting an investigation.
