GERMANS SOON WILL DESERT BRUSSELS.

PARIS, Oct. 19.—A high German functionary in Belgium declared on October 19 that (German) occupation of Brussels would end at the latest within 15 days, according to reliable information received in London, says the correspondent of the Echo de Paris.

All the civilian population along the Belgian coast has been moved back out of the country and British aviators are said to be reporting fires over a vast area.

NOTICE OF "REFERENDUM ORDERED BY PETITION OF THE PEOPLE TO REPEAL ORDINANCE NO. 918."

A referendum petition having been filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on February 6, 1918, for the repeal of Ordinance No. 918, and transmitted to the Common Council, which took no action thereon, a vote will be taken on a referendum ordered by petition of the people at the next regular city election.

The following is the date and number which the measure will be printed on the official ballot:

"REFERENDUM ORDERED BY PETITION OF THE PEOPLE"
To repeal Ordinance No. 918, granting the Standard Oil Company, a corporation, permission to locate, erect, operate and maintain warehouses, tanks and other necessary buildings on other lands within the City of Pendleton for the storage and distribution of Petroleum and its products and other kinds of merchandise.

The full title and text of such measure is as follows:

"An Ordinance granting to the Standard Oil Company, a corporation, permission to locate, erect, operate and maintain warehouses, tanks and other necessary buildings on certain lands within the City of Pendleton for the storage and distribution of Petroleum and its products and other kinds of merchandise."

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF PENDLETON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Standard Oil Company, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of California, and authorized to do business in the State of Oregon, is hereby permitted, subject to the terms and conditions herein expressed, and is hereby authorized and empowered to locate, erect, operate and maintain warehouses, tanks and any and all other necessary buildings or structures, all within the City of Pendleton, Oregon, on the premises and structures thereon for the storage and distribution of Petroleum and its products and other kinds of merchandise.

Section 2. The powers, rights and privileges granted in Section 1 of this ordinance are granted subject to the condition that in accepting the same, the Standard Oil Company, a corporation, agrees to waive and hold harmless the City of Pendleton, Oregon, and its inhabitants, and the City of Pendleton, Oregon, and its inhabitants, from all and every liability, damages, costs and expenses, and if any judgment shall be rendered against said City of Pendleton, Oregon, or its inhabitants, the said Standard Oil Company, a corporation, shall be bound to pay such judgment within sixty days after the same shall become a final judgment of the Common Council this 2nd day of February, 1917.

The Common Council of The City of Pendleton, Oregon, has ordered that at the next general election to be held in the said City of Pendleton, that a vote shall be taken on a measure proposed by initiative petition, filed with the Recorder of the said City and transmitted to the said Common Council as follows:

The following is the form and number in which the measure will be printed on the official ballot:

"PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION"

Charter amendment authorizing The City of Pendleton, Oregon, to issue bonded indebtedness not exceeding \$75,000 in addition to all other indebtedness heretofore authorized, for the purpose of constructing, enlarging and extending the system of gravity water works and exempting such indebtedness from taxation.

The full title and text of such measure is as follows:

"To propose by initiative petition an Act to amend the Charter of The City of Pendleton, Umatilla County, State of Oregon, and to authorize and empower the said City of Pendleton to issue bonded indebtedness not exceeding \$75,000.00 in addition to all other indebtedness heretofore authorized, and to issue and dispose of negotiable bonds to an amount not exceeding \$75,000.00 in addition to all other bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by said City for the purpose of constructing, enlarging and extending the gravity system of water works and to supply said city and its inhabitants and the inhabitants of the territory adjoining the city and the territory in the vicinity of such gravity water system with water, and to exempt such bonds from taxation, and declaring that said bonds nor any indebtedness evidenced by them shall be taken into account in computing the heretofore authorized indebtedness which The City of Pendleton may incur."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF PENDLETON:

That the Charter of The City of Pendleton, Umatilla County, Oregon, be amended by adding thereto a section to be numbered, Section "I C C" which shall read as follows:

Section I C C. That The City of Pendleton shall have power and authority and is hereby authorized and empowered to issue an indebtedness not exceeding \$75,000.00 in addition to all other indebtedness heretofore authorized and to issue, sell and dispose of negotiable bonds to evidence such indebtedness to an amount not exceeding \$75,000.00 in addition to all other bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by the said City, for the purpose of constructing, enlarging and extending the gravity system of water works of the said city, to supply the said city and its inhabitants, and the inhabitants of the territory adjoining the said city and in the vicinity of the said gravity water system with water; the bonds issued pursuant to this section shall be known as "Water Bonds, Series D, D," and shall have the words, "City of Pendleton," printed on the reverse thereof and shall be issued consecutively, commencing with No. 1, and if the whole amount of bonds authorized by this section shall not be issued at the same time any subsequent issue shall be numbered consecutively with the number of the last number issued in the next preceding issue of said bonds; no bond issued pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be subject or liable to any taxation and none of them, nor any indebtedness evidenced by them shall be taken into account in computing the heretofore authorized indebtedness which the said City of Pendleton may incur.

"The Germans think we are doing the same to German prisoners. They are all told that. Only once did I see a decent German. He was a guard who had 4 sons in the British army. The old man was caught in Germany and made to serve.
"Our food was just black bread, and not very much of that. Sometimes we had soup, made of nothing but water in a big tub with a horse's head or something like that to flavor it. We were in terrible condition when I escaped. But the German soldiers are not much better off. Judging from what I saw.
"I worked on the roads most of the time, though we loaded shells for a while. No rubber was used for the automobile tires. It was iron, even for the staff cars. They bumped over the roads, and made a terrific noise, and could not go fast. Most staff cars were fitted to run on narrow gauged tracks along the roads.
"I saw Hindenburg once. They made us stand erect and still when he passed. He opened the car window when he passed me. He looked like a monster, not human. His auto had rubber tires on it. I'd have given my life gladly for a grenade then. Any one of us would—it would be worth it. Just one chance at him."
