NOTICE OF REFERENDUM ORDERED BY PETITION OF THE PEOPLE TO REPEAL ORDINANCE NO. 918.

A referendum petition having been filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on February 6, 1917, for the repeal of Ordinance No. 918, and transmitted to the Common Council, which took no action thereon, a vote will be taken on said referendum at the next regular city election.

The following is the form and number in which the measure will be printed on the official ballot:

"REFERENDUM ORDERED BY PETITION OF THE PEOPLE"

To repeal Ordinance No. 918, granting the Standard Oil Company, a corporation, permission to locate, erect, operate and maintain warehouses, tanks and other necessary buildings on certain lands within the City of Pendleton for the storage and distribution of Petroleum and its products and other kinds of merchandise.

The full title and text of such measure is as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 918.

"An Ordinance granting to the Standard Oil Company, a corporation, permission to locate, erect, operate and maintain warehouses or tanks, or both and other necessary buildings on certain lands within the City of Pendleton, for the storage and distribution of Petroleum and its products and other kinds of merchandise."

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF PENDLETON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Standard Oil Company, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of California, and authorized to do business in the State of Oregon, is hereby granted permission, subject to the terms and conditions herein expressed, and is hereby authorized and empowered to locate, erect, operate and maintain warehouses, tanks and any and all other necessary buildings or structures; all such buildings and warehouses shall be constructed of concrete brick or hollow tile, on the following described property, to-wit: Lots 3, 4, 9, 10, 11 and 12 in Block 10, in addition to all other lands owned by the said company in the City of Pendleton, Oregon, and to use said premises and the structures thereon for the storage and distribution of Petroleum and its products and other merchandise handled by the said company for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years.

Section 2. The powers, rights and privileges granted in Section 1 of this ordinance are granted subject to the condition that in accepting the same, the said Standard Oil Company, a corporation, agrees to and shall be bound to indemnify the City of Pendleton from all damages to any person, person, association or corporation, which may be caused in any manner by or growing out of the use and occupancy of the said premises by the said company, and in the event of suit or action against the said City for any such damage, the said Standard Oil Company, a corporation, shall defend such suit or action at its own expense and cost, and if any judgment shall be rendered against said City in any such suit or action, the said grantee agrees to pay such judgment within sixty days after the same shall become final.

The Common Council of the City of Pendleton, Oregon, has ordered that at the next general election to be held in the said City of Pendleton, that a vote shall be taken on a measure proposed by initiative petition, filed with the Recorder of the said city and transmitted to the said Common Council as follows:

The following is the form and number in which the measure will be printed on the official ballot:

PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION.

Charter amendment authorizing the City of Pendleton to incur a bonded indebtedness not exceeding \$10,000 in addition to all other indebtedness heretofore authorized for the purpose of constructing, enlarging, extending the system of gravity water works and exempting such indebtedness from taxation.

Vote Yes or No.

The full title and text of such measure is as follows:

To propose by initiative petition an Act to amend the Charter of the City of Pendleton, Umatilla County, State of Oregon, and to authorize and empower the said City of Pendleton to incur an indebtedness not exceeding \$10,000 in addition to all other indebtedness heretofore authorized, and to issue, sell and dispose of negotiable bonds in an amount not exceeding \$10,000 in addition to all other bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by said city for the purpose of constructing, enlarging, extending the gravity system of water works of said city and to supply said city and its inhabitants with water from the territory adjoining the said city and the territory in the vicinity of such gravity water system with water, and to exempt such bonds from taxation, and declaring that said bonds nor any indebtedness evidenced by them shall be taken into account in computing the heretofore authorized indebtedness which the City of Pendleton may incur.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF PENDLETON:

The People of the City of Pendleton do ordain as follows:

That the Charter of the City of Pendleton, Umatilla County, shall be amended by adding thereto a section to be numbered, Section "I C" which shall read as follows:

Section 1 C C. That the City of Pendleton shall have power and authority and is hereby authorized and empowered to incur an indebtedness not exceeding \$10,000 in addition to all other indebtedness heretofore authorized and to issue, sell and dispose of negotiable bonds to evidence such indebtedness to an amount not exceeding \$10,000 in addition to all other bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by the said city for the purpose of constructing, enlarging and extending the gravity system of water works of the said city, to supply the said city and in the vicinity of the said gravity water system with water, and to exempt such bonds from taxation, and declaring that this section shall be known as "Water Bonds, Series D," and shall have these words, written, printed and engraved thereon and shall be numbered, consecutively, commencing with No. 1, and if the whole number of bonds authorized by this section shall not be issued at the same time any subsequent issue shall be numbered commencing with the number following the last number issued in the next preceding issue of said bonds; no bond issued pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be subject or liable to any taxation and none of them, nor the interest evidenced by them shall be taken into account in computing the heretofore authorized indebtedness which the said City of Pendleton may incur.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—The German armies should not be considered as definitely and finally broken, but observers say allied soldiers who are fighting their way forward in the face of great enemy resistance know that the enemy is not broken and that much heavy fighting probably will have to be faced. At the same time reliable reports continue to reach London of increasing dissatisfaction among the German soldiers. This dissatisfaction has led to actual mutiny in many cases.
