**Teachers Are Aiding.**  
Because the influenza epidemic has closed the Hells school and thus ended a halt to Junior Red Cross work the teachers of the school are contributing the amount of bedside beds recently sent to the children, so that the quota will be finished in time. Miss N. Gray, who is a teacher in the school, was in Pendleton to get more supplies for the beds.

**Best Maloney for Mayor.**  
It has been learned this afternoon that a well organized move is underway to have the name of J. W. Maloney for mayor tomorrow. Cards are being distributed. It is said that the move is taken without authority of Mr. Maloney but his backers are going on the assumption he will accept the office if elected. His name is not on the ballot and will have to be written in.

**Sure of Acreage.**  
Umatilla county will have no difficulty in supplying an acreage of 173,921 acres fall sown wheat this year in accordance with the wish of the state council of defense, says County Agent M. E. Shrock. He says that the number of acres is only about seven percent more than sown last year and that fall sown wheat is more necessary than the spring sown. Umatilla county farmers are anxious to increase the acreage, according to Mr. Shrock, both to aid the government and because of the high price of wheat.

### TRENT TAKEN SOLDIERS POUR THROUGH LINES

ROME, Nov. 4.—The Italians have captured Trent, one of Austria's chief fortified towns in the Tyrol, according to a war office announcement last night.

Italian cavalry have entered Udine.

WITH THE ITALIAN FORCES IN NORTHERN ITALY, Nov. 4.—The Italian first army, in its advance on Trent, captured enormous quantities of material and innumerable prisoners. Entire regiments are surrendering. 16,000 CAPTURED.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The war office in an Italian communique today announced that the tenth army which the Americans are brigaded has captured 16,000 prisoners.

"The army continued its advance Sunday, reaching the line of Clotta, Pratrasio, the Maduna rivers, San Quirino and Aviano."
