YALE ACQUIRES OLD HOME

Historic Building Will House Soldiers in Training.

NEW HAVEN, Nov. 8.—In purchasing and taking possession of the famous Noah Webster house, Yale University has come into possession of one of the oldest and perhaps the most historical buildings in this city.

When the venerable lexicographer wrote the dictionary a century ago he never dreamed that the home in which he performed his literary laborers would prove the quarters of United States troops in the greatest of world wars. Yet that is the destiny of the plain wooden building. The university has turned it over to the Student Army Training Corps and it will be occupied by soldiers.

It was the home of Webster while he resided in this city, although part of his dictionary was written at Amherst, Mass. He was one of Yale's most famous professors. His work ranking in world value with that of his fellow professors, Samuel P. B. Morse and Eli Whitney.

STAMP IS REMINDER OF LUSITANIA CRIME

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—"Remember! Use Nothing German."

These words appear on a new stamp, resembling a postage stamp, being circulated by the American Defense society.

The stamps are sold, and profits go to the Fatherless Children of France, a society of which Marshal Joffre is president.

On the stamp appears a design painted by E. H. Blashfield, New York. It represents Humanity, shielding her eyes from the sight of the sinking Lusitania, and Justice, with sword drawn in vengeance.

The society reports receiving thousands of signatures to its pledge to use no German made goods after the war.

POTASH SUPPLY OF U. S. HUGE

(By United Press.)
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Germans who said the United States entered the war to grab Germany's big potash deposits didn't know much about the natural resources of this country.

A new \$1,000,000 unit of potash plant on Searles Lake, in Southern California, started operation Nov. 2. It will bring the daily production of one company operating in this one lake up to 140 tons a day. The United States before the war used only 250,000 tons of potash a year, most of which was imported. Because of cheaper foreign labor it has never been worth while to develop American potash or nitrate deposits on a large scale.

"Grabbing Germany's potash deposits" with an army and navy was costing Uncle Sam more than \$50,000,000 a day. With half a day's expenditure he could develop enough potash deposits to supply the country for a century.

Engineers estimate that Searles Lake alone will supply normal American nitrate needs for nearly a century.

Telephone Rate Increases.

PORTLAND, Nov. 8.—Rate experts of the Public Service Commission say that the advances in telephone rates announced to become effective November 15 will yield more than \$500,000 additional income annually. The question was raised yesterday as to why the rate was permitted to go into effect without an order of suspension before the date set. The Public Service Commission held that, while under the railroad act a tariff could be suspended before its effective date, no such provision occurs in the utility act.

Kulfe Duel Is Favored.

MYRTLE POINT, Or., Nov. 8.—John Dettore, a member of a Southern Pacific company work crew employed in this vicinity was stricken to death Wednesday by Tom Mangione, a fellow member of the crew, following a quarrel. Dettore was attacked, according to witnesses of the affray, because Mangione thought the former made a stirring remark about him.
