KING GEORGE CABLES THANKS TO WILSON

LONDON, Nov. 12.—King George called President Wilson: "At this moment of universal gladness I send you, Mr. President, and the people of your great republic a message of congratulations and deep thanks in my own name and in the name of this empire and people. It is, indeed, a matter of solemn thanksgiving that the people of two countries, linked in spirit as in speech should be united in democracy's greatest achievement."

NATIONAL DEFENSE COUNCIL ASKED TO ANSWER CALL

Governor B. Clarkson, acting director of the Council of National Defense and in charge of state council activities, has asked the united support of the one hundred and eighty thousand four hundred units of the council of defense system throughout the country for the United War Work Campaign. Clarkson has telegraphed all state councils as follows:

"I earnestly ask the great council of defense system to use all of its vigor throughout its more than one hundred eighty thousand units in almost every community of the nation to support of The United War Work Campaign. In these tremendous days when out of the ashes of empire new aspirations and hopes are arising for all civilized peoples, we who have stayed at home have an unnumberable and unavoidable obligation to preserve the welfare of the men who have crossed half a world to fight for us. These men are a part of the promise of the coming years for America. Anything that we can do to maintain the freshness of their outlook, to conserve their usefulness to their native land, to show our gratitude for what they have offered to lay down for us and for the descent principles of mankind, we are in simple honor bound to do. America's task in the war is not done until her men come home again. When you give to The United War Work Campaign you give to your own flesh and blood, but are strengthening the pulse beats of the national heart. Therefore, carry on and do your utmost to make this wise and noble campaign an overwhelming success."

RUSSIANS STARVE: CONDITIONS SERIOUS, SAYS U. S. DIPLOMAT

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Norman Armour of Chicago, a secretary attached to the one-time American embassy at Petrograd, and who accompanied the embassy to Moscow and then to Volodga, reached here today on his way to Washington with reports for the department of state. He came by the way of Finland.

"Petrograd," he said, "was a deserted and starving city when I left. You notice a horse standing in a street hitched to a public cab. In another minute the horse has dropped dead of starvation. You pass that way again in an hour and the people have cut the dead animal to pieces and carried it away for food. The Bolsheviks are more autocratic than the Czar and his officers ever dared be, and conditions in Russia this winter will be beyond description."

With Armour came Dr. William C. Huntington, commercial attaché of the American embassy in Russia, and Felix Willoughby Smith, the American consul at Aftis.

COOKS DO THEIR BIT IN BEATING BOCHES

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Nov. 12.—The army cook had a lot to do with winning the war. Any officer or doughboy will tell you that. The cooks are a great lot and they were continually on the jump getting food up to the boys who were fighting.

It was a common sight to see the old rolling kitchen lumbering toward the front, trying to get near enough to feed the company, and the cook keeping hot food steaming away as the horses dragged the "goulash wagon" over the torn-up shell-swept roads. Barrages didn't stop these army cooks.

The cooks fed anyone who was hungry, no matter what his company, though they always looked out for "their boys."

"Say I wish that outfit of mine would slow up enough so this old cart could catch up with them," said one worried cook, in typical words. "Believe me, C Company would never quit fighting if they didn't get a bite of food, but some hot chow would mean new life to them. Let's speed up a bit more, Jim."

So Jim, the cook's assistant, who was driving, negged the tired horses onward toward the ration sounds, while the cook himself hung onto the rear end of the wheeled kitchen, trying at the same time to stir the stew.

"Were you a cook before the war?" the United Press correspondent asked one husky perspiring cook.
"No, I was a salesman," he replied laughing, "making good money too."

"War brings unexpected changes, doesn't it?"
"In a way, yes. I never figured on being a cook over here," he said.

But the same principles apply to this job that did in salesmanship. First of all you have to have the real goods, and then you have to give it to them in the way they like it."

"Camouflage for ordinary grub, studying what the boys want, using a little diplomacy and giving them plenty—that's all there is to getting by with this cook's job. It's a great life, but the same principles apply as in salesmanship."

The shift from his kitchen influenced him to accept his heavy invitation to "have a bite with us."
