### Liberty Loan Honor Flap.

They are hunting flags also same as those loaned for previous campaigns the difference being that there are four blue bars across the field of white, indicative of the Fourth loan.

### Will Thin to Poison Rabbits.

Schrook, county agent, to make plans for poisoning jack rabbits. Meetings are planned for Umatilla, Hornston, Columbia, Sheridan's schoolhouse on north Butter creek, Stanfield and Echo. The farmers have decided to do the poisoning as soon as the first snow falls. The people of Umatilla are planning a drive also, but the residents of the Echo district have abandoned the idea because of the expense necessary to purchase wire baiting.
