

GERMAN HIGH SEAS FLEET SURRENDERED

U.S. OCCUPATION ARMY IN FOUR COUNTRIES

HOME-MADE AMERICAN FLAGS FLY IN 15 VILLAGES AS YANKS APPROACH CITY OF LUXEMBURG

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The Belgians rapidly reoccupying their country, have advanced more than 50 miles from the lines held when the armistice was signed.

Luxemburg Near. (United Press Staff Correspondent.) WITH THE AMERICANS ADVANCING TO THE RHINE, Nov. 21.—The American army of occupation is now standing on the soil of four countries—France, Belgium, Luxemburg and German-Lorraine.

Luxemburg's mayor crossed the lines in an automobile, paying his respects to Pershing at Longvion, now the general's headquarters.

The important town of Arlon, in Belgium, remembering America's food and relief work during the war, gave the American flag to the town.

New Line Reached. LONDON, Nov. 21.—The general line of the allied advance follows, Turhout, Hernalthuis, Antwerp, Brussels, Jempha, Givet, Wancennes, Longie, Habayville, Arlon, Aachen, Virey, St. Avold, Kochery, Forbach, Saarlucken, Zern, Obernai, Neuhabsach and along the line of the Rhine to the Swiss border.

BOLSHEVIKI BEATEN IN BATTLE WITH ALLIES

Four hundred allied vessels, the largest fleet ever assembled, are reported to have met the Germans. Five American dreadnaughts were included.

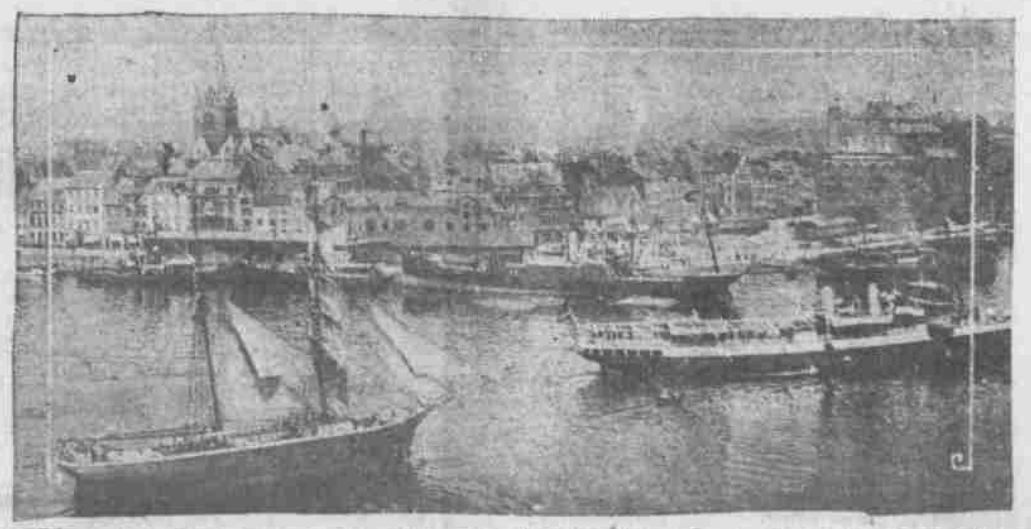
50 MILE LINE
