Mrs. Pruitt Ill.
Mrs. W. C. E. Pruitt is suffering from an attack of acute rheumatism at her home on 214 West Alta street.

Pendleton Man Killed.
Today's casualties give the name of Peter Line of Pendleton in the "Killed in Action" list. His rank is that of a private. Carl Hise, also of Pendleton, is named as the nearest relative.

City Engineer Reports on Paving.
The report of City Engineer Geary Kimbrell on the newly completed paving on Pine and Garfield streets gave the total cost of the former as \$322,226 and of the other \$210,425. The report was approved on vote.

Funeral Today.
The funeral of Andrew Lekas, the Greek who died recently of Spanish influenza in the emergency hospital, is being held today in Portland from the Dunning chapel. Lekas was 22 years of age and was occupied here as a laborer.

Charles Cole's Condition Unchanged.
The condition of Charles Cole, who has been ill for some time at his home 712 Auro, and who recently suffered a severe attack of heart failure, is unchanged, according to a report received this morning.

To Attend Father's Funeral.
E. E. Geist left yesterday for Minneapolis, Minnesota, to attend the funeral of his father, E. J. Geist, who died recently of cancer at the age of 69. Mr. Geist is survived by a wife and six children. E. E. Geist expects to return immediately after the funeral.

New Pendleton Residents.
Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Sullivan are new Pendleton residents and will make their home at 2162 West Webb street. They formerly lived in Starkey, Oregon, where they have farming interests, but came to Pendleton from Hot Lake, where Mr. Sullivan has been receiving treatments because of ill health.

S. A. Lowell Appointed.
Judge Stephen A. Lowell was appointed chairman today of the Chevrolet "Roll Call" or membership drive, of the Umatilla County Red Cross by Chairman W. J. Thompson. It is understood, according to Mr. Thompson, that the women of the county will conduct the campaign under the direction of Judge Lowell.

Pendleton Boys Corporals.
Paul Mortimer of Pendleton, and Thomas H. Hampton, also of this city, were yesterday appointed corporals in Company H. of the S. A. T. C. at Oregon Agricultural College. Their

company was one of the first to go "over the top" in the E. W. W. drive, raising a total of over \$700 in the first 20 minutes' action. The boys expect to be among the first to be moved to the new barracks building, which is nearing completion.

M. S. Shrock Returns.
M. S. Shrock, county agent, who has been absent from his office for the past two days on official business, returned today from a trip to several Umatilla county sections.

Begins Twenty-fifth Year.
George Hartman, cashier of the First National Bank, began his twenty-fifth year of service as an employee of the bank today. Mr. Hartman entered the service of the bank 24 years ago on November 26. His first position was a minor one but he has been promoted from time to time.

Kirk Is Sergeant.
Arthur Tomlin Kirk, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Kirk of Milton, formerly of Umatilla, who is attending S. A. T. C. at the Oregon Agricultural college, has been promoted to sergeant in his company. Of 150 applicants he was one of eight who passed in examinations for the aviation corps. He is a graduate of Umatilla high school.

Labels Called For.
The Umatilla County Red Cross reports that several near relatives of soldiers overseas have asked for labels because they had not received them from the boys in France. To secure a label and carton, the sender must sign a card which declares that he or she is the nearest relative of the man who is to receive the package and that the latter is the only one which the soldier will get.

On Honor Roll.
The knitting and surgical dressings sent to Northwest headquarters from the Umatilla County Red Cross have been so excellent that the production from these departments have been placed on the "Honor Roll" according to word received by Secretary E. E. Roosevelt today. The two certificates arrived this morning. Mrs. Charles Greulich, of Pendleton, is head of the surgical dressings, and Mrs. E. E. King, also of this city, has

charge of the knitting. Secretary Roosevelt says that the giving of the certificates is a result of innovation and that while other departments of the Red Cross have turned out equally good work, no shipments have been made since the honor system was installed. He is of the opinion that these departments will also win certificates.

Mrs. Newport has been here for several days, while Mr. Newport came up yesterday. He has been engaged on some contract work at Echo for some time.

Mrs. Robinson Undergoes Operation.
Miss Sabra Nason received a telephone message this morning from J. P. Robinson in Portland, saying that Mrs. Robinson, whom he accompanied to Portland to consult an eye specialist, had just undergone an operation at St. Vincent's hospital. Although the operation's result will not be known for three or four days, Mr. Robinson said his wife stood the Portland trip well.

Father in Service.
The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Olin Francis McFeron died last night and will be buried today at Weston, with Rev. R. E. Gornall, of the Methodist church officiating. Mr. McFeron entered the service some time ago and is now in France. He will be notified of the death of his child, which was five days old. Mrs. McFeron is the granddaughter of W. J. Cahill, of Pendleton.

Brother-in-law Is Dead.
John Groves of Independence brother-in-law of Dean Tatum of this city, died recently at his home after a long illness. Mr. Groves, who was about 65 years of age, is survived by his wife, who is Mr. Tatum's sister, and three children. One son is in the service. Mr. Groves was at one time sheriff of Polk county and is a pioneer of Dulles, where the body will be taken for burial. Mrs. Tatum is at Independence at present with Mrs. Groves.

May Have Auto Show.
Pendleton may have an automobile show this spring if it is possible for the dealers in this city to get the new models in time. This morning was reached last night at a meeting of the Pendleton Automobile Association, with representatives present from the Oregon Motor Garage, Pendleton Motor Sales Co., Simpson Auto Co., Overland Pendleton Co., Long's Garage, Simpson Tire Service Co., Pendleton Auto Co., Pendleton Rubber Supply Co., C. and P. Co., Independent Garage, Electric Service Station, Williams, Chase Co., and Allen & Kalkth. The show was not held last year because of war conditions but the dealers think that it will be possible to hold it this year.

Fined \$200.
Roy Sackett, plead guilty in Justice Parker's court this morning to the violation of the liquor laws and was fined \$200 and costs. Under the same charge the case against M. S. Metz was dismissed. These are the men arrested in connection with the finding of three barrels of salt in which were packed three 10 gallon tins of liquor. The barrels were brought to Pendleton in a car of boxes shipped from the east and consigned to Metz. Sackett came with the car and in his statement to the court took all blame for and knowledge of the liquor shipment upon himself. By an order of Judge Parker the liquor will be poured in the gutter on Court street in front of his office.

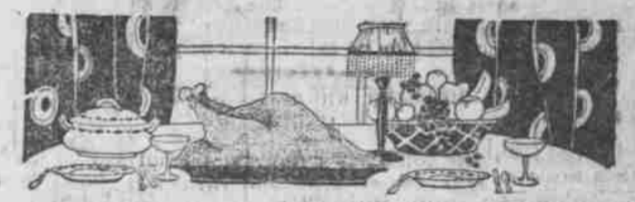
