CANTEN LUNCHES ARE VITAL FACTOR IN WORK

British Prove Good Meals Make Profitable Workmen.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Canteen lunches in war munition factories have been a vital factor in improving the efficiency of workers say officials of the ministry of munitions. Instead

of eating unappetizing food from his work-bench, the employee sits down in a well-lighted, clean dining room and for less than 25 American cents obtains a three-course meal that would be the envy of a city business man. One noon-day menu, for example, will be green pea soup, roast beef, baked potatoes, spring cabbage and ginger pudding—all for 22 cents.

A committee concerned with the health of munition workers finds that cheap foods such as bread, margarine, porridge, milk, herrings, cheese, beans, onions, cabbage, turnips and the cheapest cuts of meat provide all the requisite nourishment.

A big advantage of the canteen, according to one factory manager, is that it draws employer and men more closely together.

ADMIRAL MAYO VISITS KING VICTOR IN VENICE

ITALIAN ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Nov. 21.—Admiral Henry T. Mayo, commander of the American Atlantic Fleet, visited Venice recently and dined with King Victor Emmanuel. The admiral expressed to the king the admiration generally felt for the victory attained by Italy. Later the admiral left for Paris.

GUARD "FLU" ZONE WITH GUNS: JUDGE CALLS FOR TROOPS

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 21.—State militia to help him enter Custer county to hold district court has been called for by Judge J. E. Cowan. The roads into the county have been barricaded to enforce the influenza quarantine.

The citizens of the Challis section are guarding the barricades with rifles and shotguns. The attorney general holds that the quarantine is legal and court dates are not of sufficient importance to justify calling out troops to break the court.

Judge Cowan declares the citizens are threatening law enforcement and bloodshed is feared.

FORTUNE HUNTERS SEEK BURIED GOLD

MURPHYS, Cal., Nov. 20.—History has it that in the early days a negro named "Buster," who mined on San Antonio creek, had a vast amount of gold dust—a barrel even full of the precious metal—and he buried it. POLISH FALCHONS IN GREAT REVIEW

WITH THE AMERICAN TROOPS IN FRANCE, Oct. 20.—(By mail.)—Polish falcons, more than half of whom are from America, have won the admiration of armies in Europe by their consistent service. Recently the French honored these Poles in an impressive ceremony in Lorraine, when the entire division swore allegiance to the allies.

The Polish falcons are volunteers, serving on the same basis as the other members of France's foreign legion. All the Poles from America could have joined the American army, but chose to serve in the Polish legion at 5 cents a day, and to fight as Poles for an independent Poland. The division is commanded by an Austrian general.

After their training in the rear areas of France, the Poles had their first taste of front line service in the hills of Alsace. Just before the last German offensive of the spring, they were brought to the Champagne sector, where they fought side by side with the American Rainbow division.

The Yankee troops were delighted to find most of these lively and optimistic fighters in blue uniforms and square topped caps spoke good American slang, and the Poles were open in their enthusiasm at being with the doughboys.

The Lorraine ceremony was a fitting climax to a hard summer's fighting. It began with a breakfast on Place Stanislas, Nancy, at which President Poincaré of France, numerous

French notables, and a number of French officers were present.

Austrian Airmen Were Pretty Well Whipped

ROME, Oct. 21.—An Austrian airman captured recently on the Italian front provided some information that bears testimony to the extent to which Austrian aviators are dominated by the intense flying men it Italy.

He stated that before any war flight is made on his particular army area, permission must first be obtained from the "kolof," who in turn must request authority from the army operations branch. Hostile aircraft may be flying over the aerodrome, yet it is not permissible for a scout to ascend unless permission is first obtained from army H. Q. Austrian pilots, he said, even had difficulty in obtaining permission from squadron commanders for practice flights.

This prisoner said that, in 6 months at the front, he had flown over the lines only 5 occasions. He explained that this state of affairs was due to the fear of losing pilots and machines.

Statements of prisoners always are received with caution, but there is no doubt that the allies have established a very marked superiority over the Austrian airmen.

PETAIN MARSHAL OF FRANCE
Commander in Chief Honored by Members of Cabinet.

PARIS, Nov. 21.—General Petain, the commander in chief of the French armies, has been named a Marshal of France at a meeting of the French cabinet, presided over by President Poincaré. General Petain entered Metz at the head of the French Tenth Army.

The raising of General Petain to the rank of Marshal will increase the number of Marshals of France to three, the others being Marshal Joffre and Marshal Foch. General Petain was, on May 15, 1917, appointed commander in chief of the French armies, while Marshal Foch, as generalissimo, commanded the French and other allied armies. General Petain was a retired colonel at the outbreak of the war.

Relatives Asked to Help.
The whole question of how the morale of recently inducted soldiers can be kept up is considered as requiring serious attention. It is understood that the first step will be to ask relatives of soldiers who have absented themselves to assist the authorities in having them return promptly to spare the families the disgrace of having an armed guard sent and with a view to mitigating the punishment of the offenders.

RAILWAY HAS GRIEF THE SAME AS CIRCUS

OSGOOD, Ohio, Nov. 19.—John Ringling has found out that there are things better to run than a circus. For instance, John brought a little railroad down here in Ohio. The road runs through this town and its dead-end, Yorkshire, one mile away. Looking at business and at the near location of two railroad stations, it is a good off the railroad map, and promptly closed the station here. Osgood immediately appealed the case to the state railroad commission and now one station agent will work for two towns keeping both stations open.

BURGOMASTER AGAIN FREE.
Adolphe Max, of Brussels, Welcomed Home from Hun Captivity.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 21.—Adolphe Max, the Burgomaster of Brussels, has returned from captivity and was given an enthusiastic ovation by the populace.

Burgomaster Max was arrested while performing his duties in Brussels late in September, 1914, after discussions with the German Governor-General Von der Goltz. He was taken to Germany and refused offers of the German government to be returned to Belgium if he would change his attitude toward the Germans. In August, 1917, King Alfonso of Spain made a fruitless attempt to obtain the release of Burgomaster Max. He was liberated by the Germans several days ago in accordance with the armistice agreement.

TAKE OATH AS LOWLY HUNGARIAN CITIZENS

BERNE, Nov. 21.—Budapest newspapers received here contain details of a remarkable ceremony in which Miklós, Josef of Austria and his son Josef Francis took oath to the Hungarian constitution as simple Hungarian citizens named Hapsburg. The newspapers say this was the first instance in 100 years when such a renouncement was made. All privileges were given up by the archduke and his son.

The newspapers also say the little principality of Liechtenstein of 10,000 inhabitants situated on the Swiss eastern frontier, also has had a revolution. The prince of Liechtenstein was forced to leave the country.

SEWING MACHINES SEIZED BY GERMANS
PARIS, Nov. 20.—The Hun war against women was carried on even during the German flight from Belgium. The Germans seized all the sewing machines in Belgian cities, especially those of American manufacture. This theft deprived thousands of seamstresses of a means of livelihood.
