DEATH RIDES ABOARD SLAV PRISON TRAIN

VLADIVOSTOK, Nov. 28.—Hull dead from starvation and disease, 3221 survivors out of the original total of 2100 bolshevik prisoners and refugees in a train sent across Siberia by the Czech-Slovak troops fighting in Samaria, European Russia, have arrived at Nikolai, near Vladivostok. The journey from the Ural mountains to the Pacific coast occupied six weeks. The survivors reached Nikolai in 48 cars. The train carried no provisions and was without sanitary equipment. Of the 800 persons missing from

the original total, some were shot while trying to escape from the train. Others lost their lives by throwing themselves from the car windows. Disease, starvation and exposure accounted for the remainder.

Red Cross Will Aid.

The American Red Cross is taking care of 200 of the survivors in an improvised hospital. The Russian authorities, co-operating with the Americans, are looking after 20 typhus cases and 100 other sick who have been lodged in the Russian barracks.

Bolshevik Nurses on Train.

Among those reaching Nikolai were a dozen women who were formerly nurses in the bolshevik hospital at Samaria. Many innocent persons were included.

Laird is Identified.

PORTLAND, Nov. 28.—John Cyril Laird, alleged murderer of Frank W. Twombly, was identified yesterday as J. K. Giles, alias Jack Krutch, who was sent to the Washington state penitentiary from Lewis county July 4, 1915, and who was granted a condi-

tional pardon August 4, 1918. Laird is now wanted at the prison as a parole violator.

Siletz Rates Increased.

SALZEM, Nov. 28.—Commodity rates on the Yainy & Siletz road were allowed to increase approximately 25 per cent in an order issued by the public service commission today, while class rates were reduced in some instances and increased in others.

U. S. ENGINEER BESTS PAIN ON BATTLE FIELD

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—Gordon Edwards, the man who conquered pain, is about to place at the disposal of our surgeon general his remarkable anesthetic.

After four years work on the British, Belgian, French and Italian fronts, he has returned to America to consult the medical officials of our army.

In his first talk since landing, he outlined his revolutionary method of eliminating all pain from wounds. He does not employ the "alleviators" of any new drug or formula, but simply the perfection of a treatment, whose wonderful results in the hospitals abroad have been the cause of "the man who conquered pain."

"It is a simple procedure," he said, "and therefore often difficult to keep and wounds clean and freshly dressed, because of the pain and about the patient's sufferings when dressings are changed. For this reason an anesthetic which permits of frequent treatment for the wounds of moving men at the front is most working against recovery."

Home in California.

Young Edwards is an American citizen, born in Milwaukee, whose home was in California. Letters from General Siletz and countless Italian and French surgeons and patients, which he has brought back to this country,

tell of the complete success of his treatment on exposed nerves, badly lacerated surfaces, amputations and deep flesh wounds.

GERMAN NAVY IS NOW DISGRACED FOREVER

FIFTH OF NOVEMBER, Scotland Nov. 25.—Germany's navy has been ruined for all time, in the opinion of a German lieutenant of one of the warships surrendered to the allies. He said today: "Now we have only a dishonorable record. No one will want to serve in a discredited service."

Inspection of the German vessels is proceeding. They are in a deplorable state, having been apparently neglected for a long time.

Bank Deposits Increase.

SALZEM, Nov. 28.—Total bank deposits in the state aggregated 4724,528,793.22 November 1, according to a statement issued today by Superintendent of Banks Bennett. This is an increase from August 31, 1918, of 479,452,285.24.

Total resources show an increase of 230,619,787.79, and total surplus deposits an increase of 15,947,612.57.

J. D. Farrell Appointed.
