Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received at the office of the City Recorder in Pendleton, Oregon, up to December 11, 1918, at 5 o'clock p. m. of said day for the purchase of \$20,000 water bonds of The City of Pendleton, said bonds to bear date of January 1st, 1919, and to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, said bonds to mature 10 years after date, and to be redeemable at the option of the city of Pendleton in the sum of \$2000 each year after the expiration of one year from the date of said bonds. KARL PLANS ENTERING AUSTRIA ELECTIONS

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 4.—Former Emperor Karl plans entering the March elections in Austria, at the head of a democratic monarchist party, according to a Vienna dispatch today.

Trip Marks End of Old Policy of Aloofness Is Europe's Opinion

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The presence of President Wilson at the peace conference is almost entirely necessary, in the opinion of London morning newspapers. All quoted volitionally from the text of his message to congress. "The president's presence will quicken the proceedings," said the Telegraph. "His mission to France marks the end of the United States' old, jealously and cultivated policy of aloofness," said the Times. "The allied governments utterly desire the president's personal counsel. If the trip to the conference is a sacrifice to America it is one Europeans deeply appreciate."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Discussion of Wilson's peace terms broke out in the senate today when Frelinghuysen of New Jersey introduced a resolution calling on Wilson to interpret them. Borah introduced a resolution providing open sessions when the senate considers the peace treaty.

WOULD CREATE OVERRULING POWER.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Senator Smith of Georgia today introduced a bill restoring authority to the interstate commerce commission to overrule regulations and rates made by the director general of railroads.
