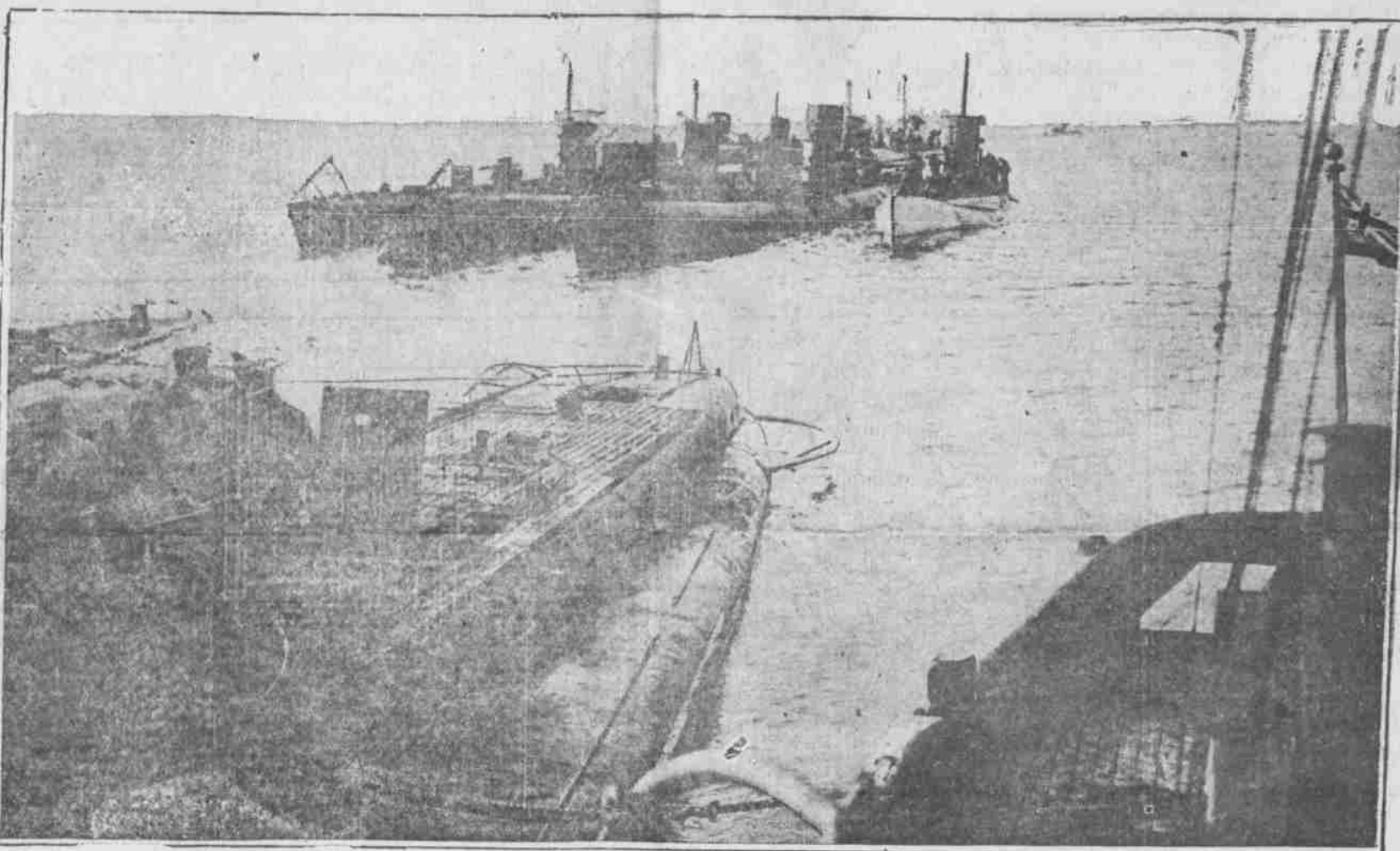

MAN WORTH \$100,000 HAS FAILED TO TAKE HIS QUOTA IN UNITED WAR FUND DRIVE

To the Public: In keeping with its pledge and in fulfillment of its duties, the Central Loyalty Committee of the Umatilla County Patriotic Service League herewith presents the names of A. A. Cole and Ed Nelson, both of Pendleton, as citizens who have failed and refused to contribute to a patriotic war fund without good cause.

Mr. Cole is a retired sheepman. He owns in this county in the neighborhood of 5000 acres of land and the assessed value of his property in this county is more than \$33,000.

Our records show that he subscribed for \$10,000 worth of Liberty Bonds of the second issue and none since or before.

For one whom the war has touched only to enrich, the committee feels that Mr. Cole is making a poor accounting to the county for his citizenship.

The case of Mr. Nelson is somewhat different. He is a working man, a barber by trade. There has been hardly a war drive that has not brought in complaints of his attitude and many complaints have been received between drives.

Mr. Nelson's attitude has been variously interpreted. Some have defined him as an extreme pacifist, some as a religious fanatic and others as an anti-American.

Two of the delinquents, whose names were authorized for publication Friday evening, completed their subscriptions yesterday to enable Saturday afternoon, and their cases are considered settled.

TROOP D MANNED BATTERY NEAR MEUSE DURING LAST DAYS

"An old cavalry outfit from Pendleton" (Troop D) is mentioned as manning a battery of guns at an artillery position at the front near the Meuse river in a graphic account of the last days preceding peace written by Lieut. Col. George A. White, Adjutant General of the Oregon National Guard prior to his muster into federal service.

He says he was at the front the night the German peace emissaries arrived and was also at the front the night the Americans took Sedan. He had gone on through the mud on the other side of the Meuse river to the infantry outposts where the firing was desultory and met the Pendleton men late in the afternoon when he reached the artillery positions.
