Tomorrow morning a regular

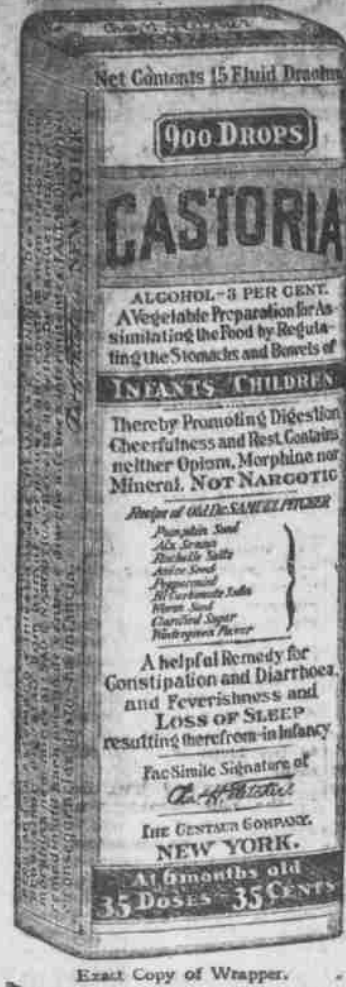
