PARIS, France, Dec. 31.—The presence in Paris of a delegation of members of the Luxembourg government draws attention to the uncertainty as to the future of that state. The middle class faction seems to favor union with Belgium, while the working people favor union with France. Both France and Belgium would welcome Luxembourg within their frontiers, but thus far there has been no evidence of a dispute between them. The question will doubtless be left entirely to the decision of the Luxemburgers themselves.
