60,000 MINES LAID BY YANK VESSELS

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Among the passengers who arrived here from Liverpool was Captain Ovan G. Murfin, an American who went to England in November, 1917, to assist in the laying of mines in the North sea. "We received all possible co-operation from the British naval authorities," he said, "and took over two manufacturing in Scotland, one at Inverness and another at Larnach, where the new mines were to be made. One thousand Americans were taken over and within four months we had assembled all the parts of the mines and were turning them out faster than we could lay them. The Americans laid about 60,000 mines in the North sea and the British about 15,000.

"The area in which the mines were laid extended from the north of Scotland to the Cotentin. All the machinery was put in working order in the converted distilleries by the Americans we took over and we turned out a very effective mine.

"No effective was the new invention, which is still a secret, by the way, that we were planning the mining of the Mediterranean when the armistice was signed.

"The British naval people acknowledged that the work we did was of inestimable value and proved one of the great obstacles to Germany's U-boat warfare."



"The happiest girl in all Germany to see American soldiers enter Metz was Miss Mary Grass. When Miss Grass came to Metz a year before the war started to make a long visit with relatives. She was there when the war broke out, and then it was impossible for her to return home. She was almost overcome with emotion on seeing some of her fellow countrymen. 'I haven't spoken a word of English for five years,' she said. 'All my relatives and friends here speak nothing but German.'"

AGRICULTURE TO BE BASIS OF INDUSTRY SAYS LLOYD GEORGE

LONDON, Jan. 12.—Radical agricultural reforms are proposed for the incoming government by Lloyd George. Agriculture is to be regarded as the basis of all national industries if the premier's program is followed.

The food production department, under Sir Charles Fielding, is to be made more permanent and to work for the maximum food production in the island.

Transfer of land is to be made easier and cheaper and tenure of land workers secure. Ownership of land is to carry with it the legal obligation to produce the maximum amount of food for the people, which will bring under production thousands of acres and result in the breaking up of large holdings now lying fallow.

Waste land is to be reclaimed and devoted to cultivation. Capital for this purpose is to be supplied on easy terms.

Trees are to be planted on land suitable for no purposes but forestation. This will be a beginning for replacement of the great quantities of timber cut for war purposes. More houses and cottages are to be built in the country and better education provided for agricultural workers.

Cheaper and better transportation from farm to market for produce is promised.

Who Would Miss Desserts in Dinner Like These?

OREGON AVIATORS IN FRANCE MADE PROUD

RECORD FOR HEROISM
Man Known in Pendleton
Tells of Brave Work
of Boys.

PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—After several months of active service in the aviation branch of the American forces in France, Lieutenant Arthur M. Geary of Portland returned to his home Wednesday night. He came direct from Garden City, L. I., where he received his discharge last Thursday. Lieutenant Geary was awarded a commission after training at the second officers' camp at the Presidio, and sent to Kelly Field, Texas, where he acted as assistant executive officer for seven months. He was in similar work at the air service concentration camp in England and France for four months prior to being de-

tached for duty at air service headquarters in France.

The experience and brave acts of several Oregon flyers were described by Lieutenant Geary. "There were few Oregon boys who saw actual fighting over the lines, but among those was Lieutenant Roscoe Hitchcock of Medford. After being mortally wounded by machine gun fire on September 3, Lieutenant Hitchcock, in a dying condition, landed his machine and observer behind the American lines. Lieutenant Newell Barber of Medford and Hugh Bloomfield of Gladstone also lost their lives doing brave work."

Lieutenant Roscoe Fawcett, former Portland sporting writer, received injuries when he fell in a fight from London to Paris on a mission to see General Foulis, according to Lieutenant Geary. "The crash netted him two broken jaws, a broken nose and the loss of several teeth in addition to sprains and bruises."

Lieutenant Geary has three brothers who are also in the American air-

service. Lieutenant E. A. Geary is now on his way home from Camp Morrison, Va. R. E. Geary is flying at March Field, Riverside, Cal., and Lieutenant Roland W. Geary is completing an advanced course in aerial machine gunnery at Glouch, Texas.

Idaho Will Pass Red Flag Law. BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 10.—The red flag of disloyalty, if displayed in the state of Idaho, will send to the penitentiary those guilty, if the legislature now in session here passes the bill introduced in the senate this afternoon by Senator John D. Robertson, of Washington county. The measure will meet with unanimous approval in both houses. It strikes directly at the heart of the bolshevik movement.
