Roads to Prosperity Planned in Illinois

(By United Press)
SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 18.—Illinois is going to "kill two birds with one stone" by taking care of its surplus labor resulting from the war's end and at the same time building a few more miles of hard roads.

State leaders forecast that the end of the war would create a labor surplus. At the same time there was an agitation on foot for a statewide system of hard roads.

The two propositions were combined in a hard road bill and passed by the last general assembly. The legislative act immediately was received with favor because it not only was planned to solve Illinois' after-the-war labor problem but at the same time satisfy the demand of thousands of motorists, farmers and manufacturers. The proposition was placed before the voters at the November elections and was adopted with little opposition.

It is planned to construct approximately 600 miles of hard roads touching every county in the state. The division of highways now is laying plans for the opening of work probably next spring or as soon thereafter as labor and material conditions warrant.

Photographs Accident to Machine While he Makes Test Flight

LONDON, Dec. 3.—(By mail.)—For steadiness of nerve and concentration of purpose it is impossible to beat the flyer man.

An airplane designer was flying as observer in one of his own machines in order to have personal experience of its working. He was many thousands of feet high when he saw that a couple of wires had broken loose and were swinging in the wind. He got up, took out his camera and photographed the flapping wires. Afterwards he exclaimed: "I thought if we crashed and were killed the camera's record would tell my friends what had happened."

RETENTION OF RHINE DECLARED DANGEROUS

AMERICAN HEADQUARTERS IN GERMANY, Jan. 18.—If the Rhineland is taken from Germany the spirit of revenge will be engendered; the spirit that will bring another war, Count Von Groote, governor of the Rhineland provinces, declared today to the United Press. (Echo in an interview today declared France in self-defense, but keep its hold on the Rhine.) Von Groote made emphatic his assertion that the Germans would never forget any retention by France of the Rhineland territory.

Redemption would be the ultimate redemption of such territory by Germany would be the object of their "hopes and endeavor," he said. "Germany, as a whole, would consider such a severance as a gross violation of the fundamental conditions for an equitable peace of nations, as proclaimed by President. The territory on the left bank of the Rhine belongs to Germany and is thoroughly German. (This is the view the Americans and allied troops now occupy.) These sentiments are most emphatically shared by the Rhinelanders themselves. They would

FRENCH CASUALTIES PUT AT 4,762,000

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—Casualties in the French army up to Nov. 1, excluding Colonial troops, were 4,762,000, according to official figures furnished by the French high commission. These include: Killed in action or died of wounds, 1,628,000; missing (and given up for lost), 292,000; wounded, 2,842,000, and prisoners, 135,000.

Less than 700,000 of the wounded are unable to work and have been pensioned. The French government estimates that when all prisoners are returned from German camps, the total number of unfit and pensioned will be between 800,000 and 900,000. Losses among the troops from French colonies or protectorates were 42,500 killed or died of wounds and 15,000 missing and probably dead. The number pensioned after wounds or illness was 44,000, to which must be added the unfit among the 3500 held as prisoners.

ITALY TO RUN CO-OP STORES

ROME, Dec. 21.—(By Mail.)—Following the remarkable development of the co-operative stores movement has taken in Italy as a result of the war, the Italian government has provided for establishment of these institutes under government control.

The government cooperatives will in no way interfere with the privately established ones already existing. Most of these have been established under the auspices of various organized bodies such as the Railway Employees, the various labor unions, government employees, newspaper men, and in fact by just about every civil, social, labor and fraternity body existing in Italy.

The government cooperatives at the outset will provide for supplying 350,000 families, or over 1,500,000 individuals.

It is expected that in the purchase on the open market of the food and other merchandise that will be sold by these cooperatives, a saving of 5 to 8 percent will be effected. A similar saving will be made in the selling price to the members of each cooperative. These latter at the end of the year will also participate in any profits which the government cooperatives may have acquired.

ITALY WILL REBUILD HER MERCHANT FLEET

ROME, Dec. 15.—Italy is making it a point of national pride and honor that she will rebuild her merchant marine fleet entirely in her own yards and with her own resources.

A program to this effect is now meeting with the most remarkable nation-wide support since cessation of hostilities.

To date there has been invested over 1,000,000,000 francs installing 88 new shipbuilding yards, and the number before the end of the year will be increased to over 100.

Italy estimates she will need 1,000,000 tons of shipping with which to replace her boats during the war and bring her entire mercantile fleet up to the capacity necessary to handle the business that it is now certain will come.

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Lieutenant Colonel Norman Cecil Rutherford has been arrested charged with the murder of Major Miles Charles Seton of Melbourne. The murder occurred at the residence of Major Seton's cousin, Malcolm Cotter Seton, secretary of the judicial and public department of the Indian office.

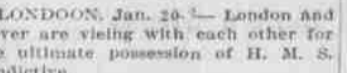
