TURKS SURRENDER IN ANSWER TO DEMANDS OF BRITISH MILITARY

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The Turkish garrison at Medina (a Holy city in Arabia) has surrendered to the Arabian forces under King Hussein Hedjaz, said a dispatch from Constantinople today.

The surrender was carried out on Monday.

The British military authorities recently served an ultimatum upon the Turks, declaring that all of the forts on the Dardanelles would be destroyed unless the Turkish garrison at Medina capitulated.

FREE DISPENSARY SERVICE IS GIVEN U. OF O. STUDENTS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 21.—Free dispensary facilities are now offered students in the University of Oregon. The dispensary has been established in connection with the University infirmary, which, with two graduate nurses, in attendance, is equipped to handle the ordinary run of illnesses among the students. The dispensary is open from 1:30 to 2:30 seven afternoons in the week. Students having colds or other symptoms of illness are requested by the administration to go to the dispensary, where they may see a doctor and receive medicine free. Prescriptions are given for any medicine not held in stock at the dispensary.

By order of President Campbell, no student suffering from illness is permitted to remain in any fraternity or sorority house or in any of the University halls of residence. Choice is offered of the infirmary, the hospital down town, or the students' own homes as places to take treatment during illness.

Cattle Market is 50 Cents Lower in Portland Yards

PORTLAND, Jan. 21.—One hundred carloads of livestock entered the North Portland yards over Sunday and a very large per cent of them consisted of cattle.

Market for cattle, which has shown signs of weakness for several days at North Portland, has emerged with a very weak tone with a loss of at least 50c all through that division for the week's opening.

Arrivals consisted of rather good quality, there being some especially good stuff available from Idaho and some favorable offerings from the Willamette valley although much junk continues to come from all sections.

U. S. TO BRING BACK CITIZENS IN TURKEY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Steps are being taken by the state department to bring home from Turkey some 2,500 naturalized Americans who have been there during the war. It was said today a warship probably would be sent for them.

Some delay is anticipated because of the absence of the American consular and diplomatic representatives who were withdrawn when diplomatic relations were broken between the United States and the Ottoman Empire.

The British and French authorities, assisted by American officials, are looking carefully into the status and past activities of some of the naturalized Americans, as it is suspected that they returned to Europe to make trouble with their acquired American citizenship as protection.

Little difficulty has been experienced in aiding the native Americans and the naturalized Armenians, Greeks and Syrians.

CANADA SOLVES WORLD FOOD PRODUCTION

As a part of its reconstruction and rehabilitation program, Canada has decided to abolish land idleness.

Every acre of publicly owned arable land is going to be made to produce.

Every privately owned fertile tract withheld from use is going to be taxed till it becomes a liability to its speculative owner and he lets it go or cultivates it.

Settlers who go upon the land will be able to buy it either from the government direct or at prices fixed by the government. They will have 20 years to complete their payments, and will be supplied with money to help them in getting a start.

J. A. Calder, Dominion minister of immigration and colonization, is responsible for the new Canadian land plan, which has been endorsed by the provincial premiers.

FAMOUS INVENTOR OF "TRIPLE VALVE"

DIES IN PITTSBURGH
PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 21.—Walter V. Turner, manager of the engineering department of the Westinghouse Airbrake company, and an inventor of note, died in a hospital here Friday after a brief illness. Rising from a Wyoming sheepherder to one of the country's foremost authorities on pneumatics, Mr. Turner had more than 400 patents granted for various inventions, one of these, the "K" triple valve, is said to be valued at \$25,000,000.
