HOOVER CABLE MAY SAVE FAMINE FUND

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Herbert Hoover has been asked to release the hundred-million dollar "famine fund" from defeat by the United States Senate. Administration senators are anxiously awaiting Hoover's action in behalf of Senator Borland's charges that he arranged with American packers so they were able to dispose of a vast surplus stock of pork and other meats at high prices by cre-

ating a new market in Europe. The "famine fund" will probably be passed without Hoover's denial but administration leaders admitted they are worried over the tremendous opposition.

Fatty Denies Charges.

PARIS, Jan. 22.—Hoover today flatly denied charges that he worked in the interest of American packers.

He told an assembly in a meeting room of the Chambre des Passeurs, a group of foreign importers, that brings the report that he was secretly planning the "famine fund" for increasing their profits \$10,000,000 in the last year.

He denied that the packers would appreciate a wide circle of such friends.

AUXILIARY PLANT NEEDED FOR CITY
