LONDON, Feb. 3.—Picadilly Circus like Broadway, is strewn with pitfalls for the glibbed and unwary. At least, that is what an English father proclaimed when, in a remarkable family deed, he included the proviso that his spectrified son was not to go within eight miles of the circle of white lights without his wren consent.  
The story became known through an article in the "Daily News" which had a headline: "The son had become a bankrupt, and his attorney argued that the deed by which his father had settled an annuity on him reduced him to a form of servitude, and the conditions were that the son should not in future associate or have business or social relations with a number of persons named in a schedule to the deed."

## OBJECTORS TO WAR RESTORED TO DUTY

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., Feb. 3.—The one hundred and nine conscientious objectors to serve in the United States army who today were honorably restored to duty and discharged from the United States disciplinary barracks here and the army, today all had departed from Leavenworth, the majority returning to the places from which they were inducted into military service. Two of the total of 113 ordered discharged who refused to leave, "as such would not be for the glory of God" and two were too ill to be sent away, still remain tonight.  
For the two who insisted on remaining in the prison, one of whom maintained that "when the Lord gets ready he will open the prison gates," the war department is expected to find some means for dealing with their case. The sick men, it is said, will be given an opportunity to testify as soon as they are able.

## YOUNG BANDIT JUMPS FROM TRAIN WINDOW

SEASIDE, Feb. 3.—George Haines, juvenile prisoner, who was taken to the county jail at Coquille on the charge of having stolen automobiles to use for joyriding, escaped through the window of a moving train on which he was riding. He was not hurt and made his escape to the brush, but was later found near North Bend and arrested. Several younger boys were implicated in the matter with Haines and will be tried in the juvenile court.

## Enemy Afloats Liberated.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 1.—After proving that they had no evil intent against the government in shipping an coastwise vessel, Ernest Treder, ex. Karl Wundt, Charon Spear and Otto Wurchauer, registered as enemy aliens in Seattle, San Diego and San Francisco, respectively, were liberated today. They had been seized on their vessels by customs inspectors here.

## WESTERN GRAIN CROPS ESCAPE WEATHER INJURY

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.—Western crops have been unfavorably affected by weather conditions, according to information which was received today from Federal Reserve Agent John Ferris.  
There has been a marked deficiency in the seasonal rainfall in Oregon, California and Idaho, and cold weather has prevented plowing and seeding except in California and southern Idaho.  
The estimated loss has been placed at from 5 to 15 per cent.  
Grain crops, however, have not suffered materially and have been greatly benefited by the recent rains along the Pacific coast.
