Seeking Return of Soldiers.

Efforts are being made at La Grande to speed up the return of the La Grande hospital unit which is now with the army of occupation in Germany. This unit went to France in September, 1917, and has done valuable service in some of the hardest fighting. Dr. E. B. Waffle, son of Mrs. B. S. Waffle of this city, and Tom Murphy, a Pendleton boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Murphy, are members of the unit. Petitions have been signed at La Grande asking the war department to release the unit from duty and let it for early return. The petitions will be sent to Washington.

Plans for Physical Training.

Holman Ferrin, boy's athletic instructor of the high school, announced today that a course in physical training will be offered the boys of the school during the next semester and that it would be started during the next week. It is planned to call a meeting of the boys, ascertain each one's height and military experience. Then, with the help of this information, acting corporals will be appointed. The course will contain military drill, setting-up exercises and other physical drills. It will be held three times a week during the conference period and, in addition, this period to thirty minutes, school will be assembled at 8:30 each morning. The girls of the school will be given a like course under the direction of Miss Margaret Crim, physical instructor in the public schools.
