MILITARY PRISONERS TO RECEIVE CLEMENCY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—Revision of sentences imposed by general court-martial for offenses committed during the war, is to be made by a board of officers constituted in the office of the judge-advocate general of the army. Secretary Baker announced that the result would be "substantial reduction of the sentences in nearly all cases save those of the gravest character or where aggravated circumstances exist."

The exact number of military prisoners held at home and overseas who might be affected was not made known, but Mr. Baker recently informed the senate that 22,000 trials by general court-martial had been held since the beginning of hostilities. Approximately 250,000 other cases were heard, but as the charges were not of a serious nature the trials were by special or summary courts.

Conditions justify, "The cessation of hostilities and the return to conditions approximating those of peace," said Mr. Baker's statement, "render it just and proper that clemency be exercised towards prisoners convicted by general court-martial for offenses committed since the beginning of the present war."

"With this end in view a board consisting of officers of experience in civil as well as military life has been constituted in the judge-advocate's office to examine the records of these prisoners and enable the judge-advocate general to recommend to the secretary of war reduction of sentences as to the facts and dictates of justice in each case may warrant. The commanders of the barracks have been instructed to forward promptly to the judge-advocate general their recommendations as to each prisoner."

BRODIE L. DUKE, TOBACCO COMPANY FOUNDER, IS DEAD

DURHAM, N. C., Feb. 15.—Brodie L. Duke, one of the founders of the tobacco manufacturing firm of W. Duke & Sons' company, which later was taken over by the American Tobacco company, died here Saturday at the age of 72.

After the death of his father, Mr. Duke held a large portion of his tobacco holdings, although he leaves an estate estimated to be worth more

Cashier Charged With Embezzlement Lies Delirious in Pittsburg Hospital

PITTSBURG, Feb. 13.—Charged with embezzlement of \$80,000 J. S. Swartz, cashier of the Park bank, is in the hospital today in a delirious, unconscious condition. The police found Swartz in bed suffering from nervous breakdown.

The Park bank, with deposits totaling \$2,237,000, failed to open its doors today on the order of the state bank examiner. Default on the part of a bank official is said to be the reason.

VISCOUNT GREY NOW BECOMES TOTALLY BLIND

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The eye trouble with which Viscount Grey, former British secretary of state for foreign affairs, has been afflicted for years, now has culminated in total blindness, says the Daily Mail. Viscount Grey is learning to read by the Braille system of character for the blind.
