CHRIST IN FLANDERS

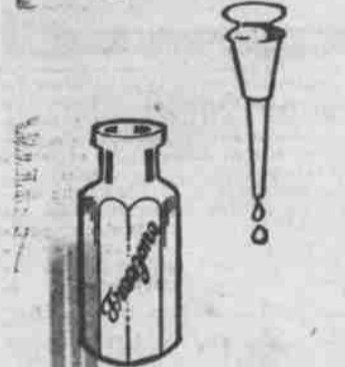
We had forgotten You, or very nearly—

For Umatilla county the state bonding is assurance of state money to match funds from this county provided the county bond issue is voted on March 4. Under the program outlined here and which schedule the highway commissioners sanction more than a half million dollars of state money is destined for work on trunk roads in the county, provided the county does its share.
 With this in view and with the further fact that the 10 million bond issue by the state will carry Oregon almost to the limit of the bonded indebtedness allowed for road purposes the necessity of voting the bonds on March 4 becomes apparent. In common sense Umatilla county has no other course save to vote for the bonds.
 There is every reason to believe our county bond issue will carry. There is no organized opposition and no grounds for opposition. However there will be many negative votes cast and there is a chance for defeat of the measure if a light vote is had. Those who oppose are quite likely to be at the polls to register their objections. If a sufficiently large percentage of those favoring the county bonds fail to vote the bond issue will meet defeat. Get out the vote.

ON THE RIGHT LINE

THE need of greater hospital facilities for Pendleton is well recognized and there is good news in the fact that steps are being taken to meet this demand. Pendleton faces the responsibility of providing hospital facilities not merely for the people of the city but for a county of 25,000 people. It is needless to say that aside from serving a humanitarian purpose a large hospital in Pendleton will reflect credit upon the city.
 Pendleton is a growing town and the Sisters of St. Francis are right in planning to keep step with its progress. They will make no mistake if they place strong faith in Pendleton's future.

GREAT IS THE PORK BARREL

IT is admitted by all who know the subject that Oregon has no proper normal school facilities. Our common school system is weak at the very point where there should be strength. There was a chance to remedy the situation last fall. A meritorious measure for a normal school in eastern Oregon and one in southern Oregon was before the people. The bill was so worded that, in case of its adoption, no building work should be undertaken until after the war. It was a timely and justified reconstruction measure.
 The bill was defeated through Willamette valley opposition. One Portland newspaper, the Oregonian, specifically advised people to vote against it on grounds of economy, though admitting the need of better normal training.
 After such parsimony in November we now have the spectacle of a move for a five million dollar state bond issue to erect buildings most everywhere except that the real urgent need of normal schools is totally neglected. It is even proposed to erect state armories in a number of towns where there are no national guard companies. But for the bona fide needs of our grade school children the legislators seem to have no sympathy.
 Great is the pork barrel; wonderful is the judgment of our reconstructionists.
 Umatilla county will have to contribute its portion of the state's \$10,000,000; let us take steps to see that we get our share of the work.

FROM THE PEOPLE

THREE INCOME TAX MEN COME
 Portland, Ore., Feb. 19.
 Editor East Oregonian:
 Urgent requests having been made to this department by taxpayers throughout the state for assistance in preparing income tax returns, I am now authorized to assign income tax officers to such work. In making the assignments, every consideration has been given in arriving at the most advantageous locations with the result that your district will be served as follows:
 Income Tax Officers Chamberlain, Davis and McLaren will be stationed at the postoffice building, Pendleton, Ore., from and including February 24, 1919, to and including March 15, 1919.
 Where forms have been sent out, the parties receiving same should produce the forms to the officer as a reference number is assigned, essential to the return of such party.
 The treasury department has extended the time for filing income tax returns to March 15th, 1919, and anyone not thoroughly familiar with the provisions of the income tax law and their obligation thereunder, should at once make inquiry of the above mentioned officer or write this office direct, as this will be the last opportunity to do so in connection with the filing of returns of income for the year 1918 prior to the date of filing.
 As soon as possible after March 15 an extensive "drive" will be made.

THE THRIFT STAMP IDEA

(Editorial from Portland Oregonian.)
 The fundamental idea underlying the new thrift stamp campaign which the government is entering upon for the current year is not the raising of a large sum of money, although this will greatly simplify the problem of paying the costs of war, but it is to promote the idea of saving.
 Every man, woman and child in the United States is to be asked to place twenty-five cents a week, or position having shorter than the small or larger denominations, in the stamp book, because it is easily met. The sum mentioned, however, again illustrates the aggregate importance of little things. It is estimated that, if the pledge is widely made, the sums which will be released for larger industrial schemes necessary to our resumption of business activity will be enormous.
