Dog Goes on Flight Across Continent In Army Plane

SAN DIEGO, Feb. 21.—Major Albert Smith, piloting the lone airplane remaining of the squadron of five which began the trans-continental trip from New York, is expected to arrive at Rockwell field Saturday afternoon according to a telegram received by Lieut. Col. Harvey Barwell, Major Smith's telegram said he would leave Fort Bliss, Texas, today and that he will make stops at Phoenix and Tucson.

Accompanying the major on his flight from New York as passenger and mascot is Flin, a police dog, said to have established an enviable record in criminal work in the metropolis and reported to be the first dog to essay a trans-continental aerial journey.

FORCED TO MURDER DECLARES MEXICAN

PUEBLO, Feb. 21.—That he was forced by two companions, who blindfolded him, to stab and rob Ynocencia Orozco, a Mexican, in Gilchrist, Colo., Jan. 25, is the assertion made by Jose Silva, also a Mexican, arrested in Pueblo Thursday and now awaiting trial on a charge of murder in the county jail at Greeley.

Orozco's body was discovered on the morning of Jan. 25, containing several knife wounds, his pockets turned inside out, and \$300 in cash and jewelry he had been wearing missing. Silva was traced to Pueblo, where he had been spending money freely, and was arrested. He admitted the fact that he had stabbed Orozco, according to Russell W. Fleming, district attorney of Greeley, but declared two companions had seized him, blindfolded him and forced him to stab and rob Orozco. Later they took the money and jewelry he had procured from Orozco's body and gave him nothing for his share in the crime, he said.

Fearing that he would be suspected of the crime, Silva said, he fled to Pueblo. He declares the identity of the two men he claims forced him to commit the crime is unknown to him.
