LEGISLATURE NEWS

The following summary of the work of the Unmatta county legislators has been compiled by Mrs. J. H. Strohm, secretary to Representative Dodd and is of interest through the fact it lists all the measures introduced by the local men.

Troy W. Ritter.

Committees—Chairman assessment and taxation; member roads and highways, military affairs, public lands, resolutions, game.

Bills introduced by Senator Ritter: 142—Fixing salaries of officials in Unmatta county. Signed by the governor, February 24, 1919.

143—Relating to stock running at large in Unmatta county. Signed by the senate February 2, 1919; signed by the speaker February 24, 1919.

144—Amending Sections 4, 13, 17, 36, 42 and 43, Chapter 333, General Laws of Oregon for 1917, relating to grain inspectors. Signed by the president February 24, 1919; signed by the speaker, February 24, 1919.

229—Amending Sections 2377 and 2378, Lord's Oregon Laws, as amended by Sections 1 and 2, Chapter 294, General Laws of Oregon for 1912, relating to primary elections. Passed by the senate February 25, 1919; passed by house February 25, 1919.

254—Making it a misdemeanor to permit water from irrigation ditches to flow upon or waste upon county roads or public highways. Passed the senate February 17, 1919.

257—Pertaining to pavement of roads and streets by county courts. Passed the senate February 26, 1919; passed the house February 25, 1919.

273 (Ritter and Burdick)—To complete a fish hatchery on Tumalo creek, Deschutes county. Passed the house February 26, 1919; passed the senate February 25, 1919.

R. C. H. 2—Providing a joint committee to make arrangements for memorial services in honor of the late ex-president, Roosevelt. Signed by the president January 2, 1919; signed by the speaker January 23, 1919.

177—Committee on Assessment and Taxation, Ritter chairman—Amending Section 2554, Lord's Oregon Laws as amended by Chapter 4, General Laws of Oregon for 1913, relating to exempting mortgages from taxation. Signed by the president February 13, 1919; signed by the speaker February 18, 1919; signed by the governor, February 24, 1919.

Member of committees for: House Bill 427—Joint committee on roads and highways—To bond the state of Oregon for road and highway purposes (\$10,000,000 bond bill).

House Bill 515—Joint committee on roads and highways—To license and regulate motor vehicles.

House Bill 375—Fish and game code. Senate Bill No. 286—To authorize the issuance of reconstruction bonds of the state.

Senator Eberhard. Committees—Chairman railroads and utilities. Member of county and state officers, election and privileges, irrigation, judiciary, ways and means, joint committee on consolidation.

11—Uniform sales act. Signed by the governor February 22, 1919.

22—Relating to confirmation of sales under execution. Signed by the governor February 17, 1919.

184—Empowering state and county officers to furnish animal books. Passed the senate February 1, 1919.

122—Relating to discharge of grand jury. Passed by the senate February 6, 1919.

124—Relating to special venire. Signed by speaker and president February 24, 1919.

219—Relating to parades. Signed by president and speaker February 24, 1919.

271—Relating to filling legislative vacancies with supreme court librarians. Passed the house February 17, 1919. Passed the house February 23, 1919.

284—Abolishing statutory salaries of utility commission officers. Passed senate February 29, 1919; passed house February 25, 1919.

Representative Dodd. In securing the passage of all the bills that he introduced in the thirty-fifth legislative assembly and that have also been signed by the governor, they are:

23—Relating to tax levy for school purposes. Signed by the governor February 25, 1919.

44—Preventing the growth of dodger. Signed by the governor February 15, 1919.

46—Foreign language bill. Signed by the governor February 7, 1919.

65—Relating to mechanics' liens. Signed by the governor, February 7, 1919.

113—Relating to contracts of teachers in public schools. Signed by the governor February 21, 1919.

373—Providing for cities and towns and counties maintaining public libraries. Signed by the governor February 25, 1919.

Besides the bills that he introduced he prepared the amendment to Senator Ritter's herd law for irrigation districts which was passed, and he also introduced a clause to one of Representative Woodson's bills providing for horns for trapping and ditching which has become a law.

Representative Dodd has taken special interest in all the road measures and supported the dairy interests in the Olee bill.

Representative Dodd was not only a member of the committee on salaries of public officials of which he was chairman, but the committee on banking, resolutions and irrigation and was appointed on three special committees, one for the arrangement of the Roosevelt Memorial Service, one to investigate the dairy interests of the state and press on butter fat, and the third on the very important special committee on reconstruction which considered all the reconstruction bills and presented the final measures which were passed by both houses.

He was the author of the bill presented by the salary committee providing that the county courts shall
