Mr. Searcy yesterday received official notice from the war department that his son had been slightly wounded in action, October 6. Searcy informed his parents that he has recovered from his wounds and is all ready to sail.

Umatilla Makes Good Showing.

Umatilla county has made a creditable showing in the adoption of French orphans. About 200 have been adopted in this county. Hermiston has adopted 33, which averages one for 26 people, while Pendleton has adopted 128, approximately one for 60 people. This is a better record than that made by Portland, which has adopted 500 orphans, or one to every 706 people.

University Wins Championship.

The University of Oregon basketball team are now the Pacific coast champions by virtue of the 20 to 23 victory over the University of California at Berkeley Thursday night. Eddie Durno, star University of Oregon forward, was again the mainstay of the Eugene aggregation, scoring 14 points. Durno will doubtless be accorded all-coast honors by all sporting editions as he has been the shining light among the entire northwest galaxy of stars this season.

Miss Brenda Francklyn, official speaker for the fatherless children of France, accompanied by Miss Sabra Nason, left this morning for Stanfield where Miss Francklyn will speak today. Miss Francklyn will speak tomorrow at 11 a. m. at the Church of the Redeemer. She is not only a war worker, but is an artist of note. Miss Francklyn is the daughter of General Francklyn, a British officer stationed in India.
