PARIS, March 12.—The peace treaty may be completed this week if the present schedule of the supreme war council is maintained.

The next step will be calling in the German delegates for submission of the draft. The plan for the establishment of a new "buffer state" composed of Rhenish provinces is expected to permit rapid progress in the determination of Germany's Western boundary, probably on Friday, the day it is taken up.

Limitation Reported. London, March 12.—The Paris correspondent of the London Chronicle says the allies have agreed to limit the German fleet to six battleships, five cruisers, 12 800-ton destroyers and 24 smaller cruisers.

A supper at the Red Cross canteen and a crowd of Pendleton people greeted the 169 Oregon and Washington soldiers, most of them wounded or gassed, who passed through here last night at 10:30 as casualties from the 162d, 163d and 164th regiments of infantry.
