PERMANENT TREATY WORK COMES UP SOON

BREST, March 13.—President Wilson's furlough is scheduled to end tonight when the steamer George Washington arrives. Boarding a special train, the president leaves immediately for Paris, arriving there about noon tomorrow. At the next meeting of the supreme war council will be called at 3 o'clock on Friday afternoon it is believed he will beg to immediately begin participation in the work of shaping the permanent peace treaty.

The council will consider Germany's western boundary. Little difficulty is foreseen in shaping this clause of the treaty owing to the agreement for establishing the Rhenish provinces as an independent "buffer state" and making an international water way.

Anti-Aircraft Battery Arrives From Verdun

NEWPORT NEWS, March 13.—The battleship Ohio and the steamship Aeolus arrived today, bringing 3805 men. Four casual companies, four casual officers, two civilians and the first anti-aircraft battery complete, which fought at Verdun and brought down 11 Hun planes, were aboard the Ohio. Fourteen casual officers and the 31st field artillery of the Texas national guard were on the Aeolus.
