THEY WILL BACK UP

HERE is not much danger that the Republican senators will insist on blocking the peace treaty and the League of Nations plan when the matter is finally placed before the senate for approval.

The League of Nations is so plainly a forward and necessary step that no political party can afford to stand in opposition to it. Should the Republican leaders in the senate insist on maintaining their present attitude they will drive their party upon the rocks. As to public feeling towards the League of Nations the St. Louis Post-Dispatch says:

We venture the opinion that the league to guarantee justice and peace among nations is the most popular thing in America, as well as Europe, and that the American people will not stand for defeating or endangering this great advance in civilization and humanity on account of party politics, personal jealousies, resentments or ambitions. Public men who are prompted by these motives to block progress are playing with dynamite. The vote in the Pennsylvania district is a warning.

Neither can the objectors expect to fool the people with clap trap about endangered American interests. Their cri-

ticisms have been shown to be groundless. They have been good as surface objections but the people are not going to deal with the league issue in a superficial way. The league answers a fundamental need of the world and people are going to see that it gets a fair hearing.

RETRAINING WOUNDED MEN

OUT of 787 cases of disabled soldiers approved for retraining by the federal board for vocational education, agriculture in its various branches is not first in numerical order, as is generally supposed. One hundred sixty-five cases have been awarded courses in commercial colleges, fitting them for office work and business careers generally. Agriculture does come next with 137 cases which are divided up into the following: agronomy, one; animal husbandry, ten; dairying, three; farming, one hundred fourteen; poultry raising, six; truck gardening, three.

The majority of those who took the agricultural course are not, as popularly supposed, men who have suddenly become converted to the beauty of agriculture by reason of exercise in trench digging in France, but are farm boys who have realized the benefit of a more scientific knowledge, and who are desirous of returning to their old home places and apply the principles of science agriculture and management.

In addition to the agricultural courses, four are taking horticulture, three landscape gardening, and one bee culture. In the main, this education is given in the land grant colleges of various states. The student is allowed \$65 a month support fund while undergoing training, and allowance for his dependents are made during that time. The federal board now has under consideration a broadening of whole field of agricultural education available for the disabled men.

The agricultural bill which was killed by the senate filibuster carried a provision that would have repealed the daylight saving law. As the matter now stands the daylight saving regulation remains the same as it was last year. The clocks are to be turned ahead one hour at 2 a. m. March 30, and the normal time resumed at the end of September.

WATCH YOUR STEP IN INCOME TAX

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Watch your step on your income tax; only a short time remains in which to pay the first installment.

On Saturday, March 15, returns on all taxes which must be paid by that time are required to be in the hands of the internal revenue collectors.

For the purpose of keeping the people informed and to avoid undue delay and confusion, the Bureau of Internal Revenue, has instructed its collectors to warn all taxpayers to the time-limit. The first installment must accompany the returns, on taxes.

It was added by the bureau. The basis upon which the returns must be made is as follows:

1. An amount not less than 1-4 of the full amount of taxes; 2. an amount not less than 1-4 of the estimated amount of taxes; or 3. the full amount of the estimated amount of taxes.

This must be accompanied by a return showing the basis upon which the tax is computed. The completed

returns, showing all items of income and deductions, should also accompany the first payment if this is possible. Taxpayers who require more time for the completion of the returns should make payments on the estimated tax due and then attach a tentative return, requesting an extension of time for completing the permanent return.

Great Appropriation For Building Roads

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The United States will have a total of at least \$74,000,000 for co-operative road building during the next three years, according to the terms of the federal aid road act. The federal part of this fund is assured by an extra appropriation of \$200,000,000 in the postoffice appropriation bill just passed by congress and signed by the president.

This amount of funds is the largest ever appropriated for a similar period by any government. It will enable the government to carry out a

roadbuilding program of a magnitude never equaled.

FOUR RUSSIAN GRAND DUKES ARE EXECUTED

COPENHAGEN, March 12.—Four more Russian grand dukes have been executed at Petrograd by bolsheviks during the last fortnight on the charge of being involved in a monarchist plot according to advices to the Berlingske Tidende.
