Meat: Russia and the Allies

Russia crumbled away and failed the Allies largely through lack of food, according to an American eyewitness.

With plentiful reserves and resources virtually untouched, her people starved at home and at the front because there was no adequate organization to place food where it was needed.

Animals on the hoof were shipped thousands of miles to the various fronts, wasting transportation facilities required for other purposes. They arrived shrunken and emaciated, to be killed and dressed amidst filth and confusion behind the lines. Half of those brought from Siberia, it is said, perished on the way; many more were unfit for food.

On the other hand, the American packers turned live stock into meat in large sanitary plants located in the producing sections, and shipped the product under refrigeration so that it reached the trenches in France in perfect condition, without waste.

Says Our Authority:

"Had such facilities for cold storage transportation been available to the Russian supply committee as were placed at the disposal of the quarter-master of the United States by Swift & Company, there might have been a different story concerning Russia's part in the final drama of the war."

OPPRESSION OF BELGIUM UNDER HUNS DESCRIBED

First hand news of the treatment of the Belgians by the Germans comes from Miss Marie Pecavet, a native of Ruyssalede, Belgium. In a letter written to her brother, Archiel Pecavet of Pilot Rock. Following are extracts from the letter:

"The Germans have been here for four years and I could not begin to tell you all we have had to contend with during this time. We were not allowed to have anything to eat in the house whatever. No butter, milk, grain of any kind; bread, meat or even potatoes. If the Germans found anything they took it away and we were made to pay a fine besides. We could not ask for anything and if we did we were punished. I was in prison three days for asking for a bite to eat for Aunt Marie. The next day Germans came and took my brother out of his bed and shut him up in a convent they used for a prison for three days.

"Then with 14 other boys he was taken to Ooghele to a prison there, and kept 14 days more. Five of the 14 boys were killed in a terrible way; too terrible to tell you of.

"The last night they were here they took a cow from our barn and took it with them. The next day the Allies came to our rescue and sent the Huns back to Germany. Uncle Charles and his family were driven from their home by the Germans, who stole and destroyed their furniture, but the Allies have driven the Germans away.

"The last day the Germans were here all the men had to hide or the Germans either killed them or took them with them."

Following is the cost, in American money, of various articles in Belgium, as reported in the letter: Cows \$600 apiece; butter, \$3 a pound; lard, \$2 a pound; bacon, \$3 a pound; beans, 27 cents a pound; sugar, \$1 a pound; shoes, \$25 a pair; hose, \$6 a pair; coal oil, \$2 a gallon, and bread 50 cents a loaf.

Replacing German Names is Big Job

STRASSBOURG, Feb. 4.—(By Mail)—The city council is working day and night removing the streets of the city from their German designations to appropriate French ones. Naturally the big French battles and generals furnish most of the new names for the streets. Rue Marechal Joffre, Rue Foch, Rue Gouraud, Rue Petain, and Rue Castelnau have already been formally christened. However old French names are not being forgotten and Rue Gambetta, Rue Deroulde, Rue Turenne, Rue J. J. Rousseau and Rue Vauban are now down on the city's street list. A few of the other new ones are Avenue de la Marcellaise, Avenue de la Vierge, Boulevard de la Marne, Rue de Verdun, Rue de Rheims, Rue de l'Argonne, Rue de Liege, Rue de l'Yser, and Rue du Cercle, the latter in remembrance of the hate kept up in the students' circles throughout the German occupation against the Hun.

SOLDIERS' RETURN BOOM FOR SPORTS

NEW YORK, March 12.—One of the most interesting and significant features in connection with the return of the American fighting man is his keen interest in clean sports of every conceivable kind. Sport-lovers see in this an unprecedented boom in sporting events throughout the United States and Canada.

Huge transports, arriving in New York Harbor almost daily, are bringing back countless thousands of American soldiers and practically every one of these is an out-and-out sport booster. The reason is not far to seek. These men have been living an athletic life such as few of them had ever dreamed of living, and now that they have got a flying start they are eager to keep up the good work.

"These men will go in strong for boxing, wrestling, baseball, football and all kindred sports," said Lieutenant-Colonel Malcolm Andrews, who has just returned from Europe. "Furthermore, they will want their favorite sports legalized and I am inclined to believe that they will demand Sunday baseball. They fought on Sunday, without complaint, and they will want to know why they cannot witness a game on Sunday if they so desire."

All sports will boom, the speaker added, but he predicted that baseball in particular will enjoy a tremendous impetus when the fighting men get home.
