The social shoot will be four 25-bird events, a total of 100 birds, with an entrance fee of \$2.50 for each 25. Purses will be divided 40, 30, 20 and 10 per cent. A large number of visiting shooters are expected to be present from Heppner and Athens to join in the shooting.

Pilot Rock to Expand.

A new addition to the town of Pilot Rock is to be platted and put on the market by John W. Etter, a prominent resident of that place. The land lies northeast of Pilot Rock on the Pendleton road. The effort will be made to locate the new high school planned for Pilot Rock on the new addition. Saturday, March 25, the people of Pilot Rock vote on the proposition of issuing \$35,000 school bonds for building a new union high school building.

From here he goes to Salem to take his old place with the Statesman.
