INVESTIGATION OF WAR IS ADVOCATED

PARIS, March 21.—"I think we should have a committee on general investigation of the war," Congressman Kahn of California told the United Press today. Kahn, who is head of the next house military affairs committee, is in Europe investigating military systems in France, Britain, Switzerland and Belgium with a view to incorporating the beneficial findings in future American military legislation.

He continued: "I intend to fully investigate and report American soldiers needlessly sacrificed in some of the closing drives of the war. Especially will I investigate the stories of men sent into battle just an hour before the time the armistice became effective. I find that strong sentiment among the American forces from the front favors universal military training. I also find a strong desire for this in the United States. I am convinced that a standing army of perhaps 200,000 will be sufficient for the United States if the proper universal training is adopted."

MORTGAGES ARE NO LONGER ASSURED

C. P. Strain, county assessor, states that this year in making the county assessment he is not assessing mortgage loan notes as in the past. This is because of the new law cutting off the tax on these loans.

May Locate in Pendleton.

ANGLING SEASON IN STATE MADE UNIFORM

SALEM, March 21.—Published charges by A. K. Downs, president of the Oregon Sportsmen's league, that the state fish and game commission is dominated by political and commercial fishing interests, will be answered on behalf of the commission by Carl Shoemaker, state game warden. Authority to issue the reply was delegated to Warden Shoemaker by the commission Wednesday morning shortly after the Downs letter was received by Governor Olcott. Downs demanded a full and complete investigation of the commission.

Without a dissenting vote the commission increased the salary of Game Warden Shoemaker from \$2400 to \$2600 a year, and the salary of Master Fish Warden Clanton from \$2500 to \$2600 a year. Secretary Brown and Auditor Moreland of the commission were granted raises from \$150 to \$165 a month. Other increases were granted to the two chief deputy fish wardens.

A closed season was placed on trout fishing in all waters of eastern Oregon during the months of January, February, March and December of each year. This conforms to the closed season in the western part of the state, and prohibits all trout angling in Oregon during these four months. Angling for bass, croppies, Williamson's whitefish, catfish and grayling is also prohibited in all waters of Oregon during the same four months. The commission voted to permit the sale of salmon taken by hook and line during the closed commercial seasons.

Salaries of all deputy fish and game wardens will be fixed by the finance committee of the commission, together with the fish and game code enacted by the recent legislature salaries of such deputies cannot exceed \$150 per month.

CAPTAIN FRED JEBSON IS LOCATED BY U. S.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 21.—Captain Fred Jebson, German naval reserve officer and subject of a world wide search following the filing of anti-Neutrality conspiracy charges against him here in connection with the operations of steamers, is alive, despite report that he was lost with a wrecked German submarine, John W. Preston, special assistant United States attorney announced here today. He doubted if Jebson could be extradited.

Preston declined to specify Jebson's present whereabouts, but said he was not in Germany or the United States.

Before his flight Jebson was prominent here as a shipping man.
