To date the office of the central library has received the following reports of circulation of books during March: Adams, 29; Echo, 454; Freewater, 148; Helix, 64; Hermiston, 663; Milton, 732; Weston, 418. This shows that Echo with a population of 400 and Hermiston, with a population of 447, circulated in one month more books than their total population.

Will Do Lab Work.

The chemistry class of the science department of the high school has finished the book in the book used and for the remainder of the semester will do a great deal of laboratory work about various metals and their compounds.
