Sheep Prospects Good.

Lambing is in full swing in Pendleton, Arlington and Echo regions, and according to Dan Smythe, the local sheep man, prospects are "favorable" for a record lambing. Smythe Brothers winter lambing averaged 125 per cent and there is every indication that the spring lambing will be better than 100 per cent. Grass, says Mr. Smythe, is excellent, and sheep are better fed than they have been for years, while the late rains bring prospects for clean wool with the best clip in several years. Mr. Smythe states that as far as prices are concerned, they are better than he anticipated and while they will be lower than last year, they are not so low as was expected when the armistice was signed. According to the few wool sales made, the price was only 15 per cent lower than last year.

Nurses to Get Bonus.

All nurses discharged from army service are entitled to the bonus of \$50 which the government gives to soldiers and sailors, according to word from Washington. All nurses, whether they have resigned, have been discharged or have left the service otherwise who have not received this \$50 bonus, should make application for it through the zone finance office, Lem-
