Don't Talk France, Says Yank Who is Back Home Again

ASTORIA, April 10.—"Don't talk France to me!" That was the first remark Sergeant Edward Wilkinson made to his friends when he was welcomed home from Camp Lewis, where he was stationed out of the service. "That country may be all right for a Frenchman, but for a freeborn American citizen—nothing doing," the former soldier said. "All that talk about 'Sunny France' is a myth. To be sure the sun does shine once in a while in summer, but talk about rain—why Oregon isn't in the mud, it's a caution. We spent eight days in Brest, and you can rest assured that all you have read about the place is true.

"I'm not the only one who has this opinion of France, for every mother's son over there is longing for the day when he can get back to 'God's country.' That's about all they talk about."

FRANCE LIFTS BAN ON DAIRY PRODUCE

PARIS, April 10.—A decree issued Sunday by the food administration removes the restriction on trading in milk, butter products and confectionery. The decree also permits the use of butter and eggs in making pastry.

Paris—Charles Surcouf, ex-mayor of Auxerre, and France's oldest "polit" has been demobilized. He is 80 years of age, and enlisted as a private in 1871, being later promoted to lieutenant.

INDIANS DIE OF FLU ANCHORAGE, April 10.—The Alaskan Engineering commission, during the recent influenza epidemic, spent thousands of dollars in providing food and medicine, for suffering Indians along the line of the government railroad. The total deaths among the natives was 31. The entire Indian colony at Quoniam, a station 103 miles north of here, were victims of the "flu" but due to the efficient work of the commission, only two succumbed. Employees, in many instances acted as nurses for the Indians.

SALT LAKE CITY, April 10.—The Bees won a hard fought game from Vernon yesterday in the twelfth, score, 3 to 2. Batteries—Froome and De Vormer; Markle and Spencer.

Big Track Meet on Today. CHICAGO, April 10.—One of the largest track meets Chicago and the mid-west ever saw opened here in the Coliseum today under the auspices of the University of Chicago.

The meet, accommodating amateur stars of long experience together with "kids" from public and parochia schools was under the direct charge of the veteran Tom Ellis. Altogether athletes faced a program of sixty-one events—including six specials in which handsome trophies were to be won.

Long straightaways were made possible in the Coliseum, making certain near record time in the shorter dashes.

Good entries had been made in all the regulation contests, a predominance of college men being noticeable, of course.

Among the stars to appear was Joe Ray, famous as a champion miler. He promised a desperate effort to at least equal the record of this event. In the 880, one of Spie's sidelines, he was again to meet the high school boy, Tom Campbell who twice has defeated him.

Carl Johnson, Michigan's track star, and Earl Gillilan, Notre Dame's all-around track man, were two notables from the college world. Officials of the Central A. A. U. will run off the meet. A capacity crowd of 6,000 was expected.

Melbourne—Flights from Australia to London, commencing next July, are planned by an aviation company formed here by Australian capital.

Serves 30 Years In 4 Wars, Now On Casualty List

TACOMA, April 10.—After serving 30 years—through four wars—Lieutenant William T. Tree has finally been recorded in a casualty list. Tree had gone through all previous engagements unscathed, and had won numerous medals for conspicuous bravery, but finally succumbed. However, his friends are rejoicing for the casualty list on which his name has been entered in Cupid's. The fatal wound through the heart was darted at the instance of a handsome widow of a pollu in France, according to advices which have been received here by friends of Lieutenant Tree.

WILSON SAYS TIME FOR TALK IS OVER

PARIS, April 10.—President Wilson explained that he was willing to accept his share of responsibility for the peace conference delays. He was careful to point out that the slowness of the negotiation was not due to any single country or its representatives. He declared emphatically, however, that the time for talk was virtually finished and that now was the time to show results.

IMPRESSION OF JAPAN IS FALSE SAYS ISHIKAWA

TOKYO, April 10.—Through the motion, text books and the stage, Americans are given a false impression of modern Japan, according to Ishikawa, the Yordou's staff correspondent to America. The geography text book used in American schools, he says, describes Japan as a country of Asiatic barbarians. A greater number of movie plays, Ishikawa asserts, are only designed to create ill feeling between Japan and the United States. He particularly mentioned "The Mikado," which, he said, is still appearing on a New York stage, although it was prohibited in London many years ago.

Paris—Clemenceau, the "Grand Young Man of France," has accepted the position of Chief of the French Boy Scouts.

Helsingfors—The production of Soviet banknotes exceeded \$2,500,000,000 worth monthly. Leuline told the All Russia Trade Union Congress.
